Administration

The Administration & Support division includes the diverse programs of Health Promotion and Education, Mental Health, and Vital Records.

Tobacco use remains the top cause of preventable

In addition to enforcing the Smoke Free Illinois Act that went into effect in January of 2008, the Health Promotion and Education section runs numerous programs that address tobacco use. Through

costs of tobacco use. Health Promotion staff explain how the tobacco industry specifically targets kids through advertising and other media.

Students also design posters with creative antitobacco messages. Students' posters are then displayed during the annual Speaking Art Against Tobacco event. In 2010, the event was held at Illinois State University with more than 150 students, parents and guests in attendance. One winner from each school is also chosen to have their posters put up as billboards throughout McLean County.

Beyond outreach to school-aged kids, Health Promotion staff members work with residents seeking help with smoking cessation through the Illinois Tobacco Quitline. In 2010, residents who accepted telephone counseling through the Quitline received up to four weeks of nicotine replacement therapy as part of the department's Break the Habit program.

deaths worldwide. There are approximately 46.6 million people who use tobacco in the US. While tobacco use has been on the decline in recent decades, the decline has stalled in the past five years. Every day 3,500 kids try their first cigarette and an additional 1,000 become hooked on tobacco.

the Illinois Tobacco Free Communities Program, staff held Tar Wars anti-tobacco classes for approximately 2,000 fourth and fifth graders across the county. Tar Wars is an interactive program for fourth- and fifth-grade students that gets participants thinking and talking about the short-term effects, image-based consequences and

Community Health Services

The Community Health Services division provides critical services such as animal control, communicable disease surveillance, dental and vision care, emergency preparedness, confidential HIV and STD testing, home nursing, and immunizations.

In the fall of 2010, the health department's dental program received a \$50,000 grant from the Illinois Children's Healthcare Foundation. In total, the foundation awarded \$2.4 million to 12 programs throughout the state in order to increase access to oral health care by establishing new services or expanding already existing services. McLean County was one of two county health departments in the state to receive funding.

The grant enabled the health department's dental program to purchase much needed new equipment for the three operatories in the dental clinic. Upgraded equipment includes a new dental chair, track lighting, an autoclave for sterilizing instruments, new x-ray machine and a cavitron that is used

for scaling teeth. Some of the equipment replaces older items that were subject to breakdowns and costly repairs. Overall, the equipment will allow the health department to serve clients in the dental program more

that lack dental insurance. By age 17, 78 percent of adolescents have experienced tooth decay.

The health department's dental program is the only regular dental service available to county residents on public

efficiently and effectively.

Toothaches are the number one cause of absences of school-aged children and are one of the leading causes of emergency room visits. For every child without medical insurance, there are 2.6 children

aid. Services available for children include exams, fluoride treatments, cleanings, fillings and preventative sealants. Adult services are limited to pain control measures and include exams, fillings, x-rays, extractions and preventative education.

Environmental Health

The Environmental Health division provides vital guidance and inspections in the areas of food, sewage and water safety to prevent disease and ensure the protection of our community.

When people think of health departments, restaurant inspections are the first activity

program. By helping ensure that all sewage is discharged to a properly designed and operated waste facility, the Private Sewage Disposal program helps eliminate the transmission of disease and protects the local environment.

A septic system is widely

structure is configured. McLean County has 9,786 active septic permits. While most equate septic systems with homes in rural areas, there are also homes within towns that do not have access to public sewer systems that operate on septic systems. Since 2000, Environmental Health staff have worked to help replace 724 illegal septic systems that were improperly discharging more than 3 million gallons of sewage into the lakes, creeks and streams of McLean County. Properties without legal septic systems are identified and required to install a legal system. Environmental Health staff work closely with the state and national Environmental Protection Agencies to help ensure the protection of the county's natural environment.

While the economic downturn in recent years has not done much to slow McLean County restaurants, it has impacted septic permits and installations. Since 2006, the economy's effect on new house construction has greatly reduced septic and well installations. Applications for septic system installation are down more than 46 percent from 2005.

Maternal Child Health

The Maternal Child Health division encompasses a variety of service areas that work toward the physical and mental health as well as the safety of McLean County children and families.

The programs that make up the Maternal Child Health division often intertwine, providing families with an array of support as they grow. As the economy continues to not only effect the health department's funding but also McLean County families, the programs have adapted to the new challenges and needs of the community by creating a more integrated approach to services provided. In doing so, staff makes better use of resources and time while creating a comprehensive support and referral systems for McLean County families.

This innovative approach led to the creation of a unique event held specifically for local families. The second annual Breast Feeding Friends Fair was held during World Breastfeeding Week in August. The fair brought together more than 20 representatives from health department programs, local health and human service agencies, and local businesses that support moms-to-be and

families. Both clients and the general public were welcome at the event.

In 2010, World Breastfeeding Week's theme was Breastfeeding: Just 10 Steps!," which focused on 10 steps to breastfeeding success. Building from that, the fair's theme was "Start

Awards & Accolades

2010 Employee of the Year

Overseeing the logistics of the clinics that led to more than 20,000 county residents being vaccinated for the 2009 H1N1 influenza was no simple task. However, 2010 Employee of the Year Annette Thoennes rose to and excelled at the challenge.

An employee for more than eight years, Thoennes oversees the administrative functions of the Emergency Preparedness and Response program. During the H1N1 response, she constantly observed clinic operations and suggested changes that helped clinics run more efficiently. Nominations cited her hardworking and cheerful nature as well as her professionalism during the highly stressful H1N1 response as just a few reasons she deserved recognition.

Beyond H1N1, Thoennes coordinates department emergency preparedness training, helps manage the McLean County Medical Reserve Corps, and assists with the procurement of equipment and vendors as well as the coordination of local partners. She is often sought out as a resource for staff members and individuals from other counties.

2010 Public Health Award

Mike Claver and Curtis Hawk were named recipients of the 18th annual McLean County Public Health Award for their furthering of public health principles, practices and services.

In their professional lives, Claver serves as State Farm Insurance Companies' superintendent of administrative services for emergency management and Hawk works as the director of the McLean County Emergency Management Agency. Both are active and key members of the McLean County Disaster Council. Years of experience in pandemic flu planning by the council became invaluable during the H1N1 response. Both Claver and Hawk were highly involved in the response, including participation in weekly phone calls and information dissemination as well as clinic logistics for more than 30 public clinics held throughout the county.

Among his many contributions, Claver assisted in developing and implementing an H1N1 Summit for key local stakeholders in business, industry, healthcare, government, public safety and schools. Hawk

provided crucial support during public clinics and beyond, helping to secure much needed resources such as vehicles, equipment and manpower as well as coordination with local emergency responders. Both repeatedly went above and beyond the call of duty, even proving to have a special knack for soothing anxious children.
