# ADMINISTRATION & SUPPORT

*The Administration and Support Division provides fiscal management for the department as well as contract services for mental health and developmental disabilities.*

## VITAL RECORDS

The state legalized civil unions in June, prompting changes to live birth and death records. The marriage category became “married/civil union,” and the mother and father categories became “mother/co-parent” and “father/co-parent.” More than 2,300 certified birth certificates were processed by the McLean County Health Department in 2011.

## MENTAL HEALTH DIVISION

The McLean County Health Department provides mental health services for residents through partnerships with mental health providers. The division worked with local community health professionals as part of the Health Vision Council to resolve a hole in mental health care to uninsured and underinsured populations. This resulted in a collaboration involving the health department, United Way of McLean County, and John M. Scott Health Services to hire an advanced practice nurse to provide services to the mentally ill.

## DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES BOARD

The purpose of the McLean County 377 Board for Care and Treatment of Persons with Developmental Disability is to eliminate, ameliorate or reduce the incidence of developmental disabilities and provide for community support services to county residents who are mentally or developmentally disabled.

# ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH

Sanitarians enforce federal, state, and local health codes. The division partners with the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) to create and administer enforceable regulations for food service and preparation, drinking water, tanning, waste water treatment, and geo-thermal installation. Examples of the Environmental Health work with IDPH include changes to the Food Service Sanitation Managers Certification, geo-thermal registration codes, and temporary-food service regulations.

Sanitarians participated in a national food-borne illness investigation in 2011, when asked to investigate a local sandwich chain franchise. Sanitarians recognized the suspected food-borne illness could not have originated from the local stores due to the extensive range of illness throughout the state and country. This rationale provided a different focus for state and federal agencies, which initiated broader investigations with the theory that the illness originated either at the seed producer or the farm where the seeds were germinated.

*Maternal Child Health Division encompass service areas that work together to improve the physical and mental health as well as safety of McLean County children and families by providing family case management, nutrition education, lead-poisoning prevention, and access to health and wellness services.*

## **WOMEN, INFANTS, AND CHILDREN (WIC)**

The WIC nutrition, education, and supplemental food program protects the most vulnerable in McLean County by supporting breastfeeding, promoting routine health care, offering nutritional education, and providing clients with nutritious supplemental foods.

The state recognized McLean County WIC program as successful in retaining clients. McLean County participated in the USDA WIC Retention Grant Project as a successful retention-rate WIC program compared to other less successful WIC programs throughout the nation. WIC also continued to support local nursing students and dietetic graduate students in 2011 by allowing students to work hands-on with clients, under the supervision of WIC staff.

## **FAMILY CASE MANAGEMENT (FCM)**

The goals of FCM are to decrease infant mortality and low birth weight rates, and assure access to medical and dental care to eligible families in Illinois. FCM was recognized by the Department of Human Services for streamlining policies and procedures.

Due to internal efforts, Teen Parent Service Program staff were maintained and services remained intact after the State of Illinois eliminated the program funding. FCM staff was further integrated with WIC clinic staff, resulting in decreased clinic wait times and less redundancy. Staff members incorporated texting to improve communication and support of clients, resulting in fewer missed appointment and improved early client- caseworker rapport.

## **ALL OUR KIDS EARLY CHILDHOOD NETWORK (AOK)**

AOK is a collaborative effort between the Illinois Department of Human Services, McLean County Health Department, area families, and local agencies. The program works within the community to ensure all children under 3 years and their families have access to services for total wellness.

The AOK Network represented the health department at various health fairs—including the Breastfeeding Friends Fair, Cedar Ridge Back to School Night, Cultural Fest, Books Alive, and the Parent Expo—which all together reached about 1,000 families. AOK also helped organize a preschool fair, Family Leadership Series, Parent Cafes, and Transition Nights for families using Early Intervention services.

## **HEALTHWORKS LEAD AGENCY**

HealthWorks of Illinois was established as the Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS) plan for the ongoing coordination of health care services for children in foster care. All children taken into the legal custody of DCFS are provided Illinois Medicaid coverage in order to ensure immediate access to medical care. From partnering with substitute caregivers and doctors to provide proper prescriptions, to overseeing the process to get eyeglasses paid for by DCFS—Healthworks looks after the health needs of children whose circumstances are out of their control.

# COMMUNITY HEALTH SERVICES

*Community Health Services Division provides programs to protect the health and wellness of McLean County residents. The division conducts multiple programs designed to promote individual, family, and community health and wellness.*

## ANIMAL CONTROL

The Animal Control Program promotes rabies prevention and control through the vaccination and registration of dogs and cats. Animal Control wardens investigate all animal bites within the county, control the stray dog and cat population, and provide animals for local adoption agencies.

The McLean County Pet Population Control Fund issued 176 spay/neuter vouchers to qualifying McLean County residents and paid \$27,989 in veterinarian reimbursements for altering procedures.

Animal Control also hosted sixth-grade students from the McLean County Community COMPACT business program and Illinois State University pre-veterinarian students to learn more about the program and career opportunities.

## COMMUNICABLE DISEASE

The Communicable Disease staff not only investigates and prevents disease outbreaks through education, it also acts as a trusted resource of health-information to agencies and McLean County residents.

The STD clinic surpassed state-defined goals by treating 100 percent of all positive Chlamydia clients within 14 days. The clinic achieved the highest HPV (human papillomavirus) vaccination compliance rates compared to other pilot program sites due to the hard work of staff in calling, sending letters and tracking clients to complete the vaccine series. The Communicable Disease staff also investigated a syphilis outbreak involving more than 40 contacts and a histoplasmosis exposure that affected 14 contacts.

## IMMUNIZATIONS

Immunization nurses provide vaccines to children up to 18 years of age who are eligible for the Vaccines for Children program, Medicaid and who are uninsured or underinsured.

Immunization staff was proactive in early administration of the flu vaccine by incorporating the flu vaccination into back-to-school immunization clinics and hosting special flu immunization-only clinics. In 2011, Tdap (Tetanus, Diphtheria, Pertussis vaccine) was offered to parents and caregivers of WIC families with infants and to all students entering the sixth grade or above to protect them from Pertussis, also known as Whooping Cough.

## EMERGENCY RESPONSE

The Public Health Emergency Planning and Response team coordinates preparedness for acts of bioterrorism, infectious disease outbreaks and other public health emergencies through ongoing planning and by strengthening partnerships with local responders and other agencies.

AmeriCorps members and volunteers from Mennonite College of Nursing at Illinois State University (ISU) and RSVP conducted a county preparedness survey in 2011, the first of its kind in McLean County. The survey was funded by the Illinois Department of Health.

ment of Public Health to study a nonurban area. The team also recruited, registered, and deployed volunteers during a county emergency response drill in October 2011 held on the ISU campus. The drill provided the opportunity for local hospitals, health care providers, police and fire departments and public health agencies to practice their response to a simulated bomb explosion.

## DENTAL

The Dental Clinic received a \$100,000 grant from the Illinois Department of Healthcare and Family Services, which allowed for the addition of a fourth dental operator. The installation of digital imaging in all the operatories, as well as computers and software to convert to electronic dental records, are planned for 2012. The dental clinic opened its fourth operator in August 2011 to better serve the increased need for dental care for residents with Medicaid or without private insurance.

Nursing students from Illinois Wesleyan University and Mennonite College of Nursing at Illinois State University developed oral health education programs for county elementary schools as part of their clinical rotations.

Health Promotion brought Gruen Von Behrens, an oral cancer survivor, to speak with 1,225 students from four rural school districts with additional funding from the Illinois Tobacco Free Communities grant. Breast-health education changed its theme to "Your Health in Your Hands," with funding provided through the Susan G. Komen for the Cure Foundation. Staff also helped plan and volunteer for the first Race for the Cure in McLean County.

The health department launched its new website — <http://health.mcleancountyil.gov>— in January, providing users with greater access to information. The change prompted more than 100,000 page views from approximately 35,000 unique visitors to the website. The health department utilized Facebook and Twitter to share health-related news and promote services.

## 2011 EMPLOYEE OF THE YEAR
