### A MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR



It is with pleasure that I present the 2012 Annual Report for the McLean County Health Department. As the challenges of public health continue to move front and center in our community, the very fabric of the response system continues to be woven stronger and stronger with the threads of cooperation.

This year, the Health Department became more connected to the community not only as the local public health provider, but as a planning partner involved with both the public and private mechanisms established to strengthen and unite our community.

The past year was one of unprecedented cooperation between the private and public health providers. As 2012 paved the path to more coordinated community health strategy starting with

ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH

The Environmental Health staff provides guidance and inspections in the areas of food, sewage, and water safety to prevent disease and ensure the protection of county residents.

The nation experienced an increase in West Nile Virus (WNV) activity, and McLean County was no exception. McLean County had one WNV human case, the first since 2007, and five WNV-positive birds in Bloomington and Normal. Public awareness and education were the focus from April to October, with 408 public contacts made regarding surveillance efforts and WNV prevention.

Partners in Prevention

MCHD Environmental Health Division and the MCHD Communicable Disease Division worked together for two different investigations in 2012. One involved several members of a group that shared a common meal becoming ill from Norovirus, and the second involved a specific strain of Salmonella infecting 22 McLean County residents with no single direct link. In both cases, the health department was able to provide safe food handling and hand hygiene education to the local food industry and the general public.

## MCH : MATERNAL CHILD HEALTH

The services of the Maternal Child Health division seek to improve the lives of children and families by providing family case management, nutrition education, lead-poisoning prevention, and access to health and wellness services in McLean County.

Maternal Child Health was awarded a \$500 grant from the McLean County Wellness Coalition to provide a 12-week nutrition education program to families enrolled in Women Infants and Children (WIC) and Family Case Management (FCM). Staff provided examples and recipes of easy ways to incorporate fruits and vegetables into daily routines of families.



About 484 women were linked to prenatal care in 2012, offering a source of revenue to area obstetrician offices and early identification of high risk pregnancies in order to reduce preterm births in the community.

About 270 people attended the fourth annual Breastfeeding Friends Fair, which featured more than 20 local sources for breastfeeding support and family health resources, with a guest presentation by Dr. Karla Kossler, OB/GYN.



Each year, more than 300 children in protective custody are assured maintained health care through medical case management from HealthWorks and Family Case Management programs within the health department.

## CHS : COMMUNITY HEALTH SERVICES

The Community Health Services division provides multiple programs designed to promote individual, family, and community health and wellness.



A public awareness campaign informed parents of the Illinois School Code change requiring all students entering 6th and 9th grades to show proof of

receiving the Tdap vaccine before the first day of the 2012- 2013 school year.

The HIV Prevention Grant program targets high-risk populations to extend life expectancy through HIV testing for referrals and early access to care. The program achieved a 4 to 5 percent positivity rate during the 2011-2012 funding period, recognizing McLean County as the highest in downstate Illinois and reflecting the program's successful outreach efforts.

The Disaster Mental Health Conference focused on first-responder mental health and was staffed by MCHD Medical Reserve Corps volunteers. Approximately 118 people attended workshops presented by the American Red Cross, Path/211, Illinois State University, Chestnut Health Systems and other agencies.



Medicaid reimbursement for adult dental services was eliminated from the state budget in July. The health department partnered with John M. Scott Health Resources and Orland Park Dental Services to maintain adult dental services for uninsured and underinsured adults. The institution of a graduated sliding-fee scale along with financial support from both agencies allowed services to continue.

The Animal Control Program provided 168 vouchers totaling \$24,687 from the Pet Population Control Fund to help income-eligible McLean County families adopt animals from the Animal Control Center and offset the cost of spaying and neutering their pets.

**HP****HEALTH PROMOTION**

Health Promotion informs the community of health issues and prevention, while promoting services at the McLean County Health Department.

More than 100 county residents attended the public screening of "Weight of the Nation, Part 3- Children in Crisis" at the Normal Theater, sponsored by the health department, McLean County Wellness Coalition, and the YMCA.

PART 3 – CHILDREN IN CRISIS

Obesity puts our children at risk for a shorter, sicker life. What must be done?

The Tar Wars tobacco-free education program reached 1,950 4th and 5th grade students from 24 McLean County schools in the 2011-2012 school year. Students created anti-tobacco messages that were displayed at the University Galleries of Illinois State University. A fourth-grade student at Calvary Christian Academy in Normal placed third on the state-level Tar Wars competition with her anti-tobacco billboard illustration.



The Youth Action Board (YAB), in its affiliation with the Heartland Coalition for Youth and Families, Project Oz, and MCHD, worked with Comcast Spotlight to produce a 30-second commercial for the "If you Really Knew Me" anti-tobacco campaign.

**CC****COMMUNITY COLLABORATION**

**The Illinois Project for Local Assessment of Needs (IPLAN) is a community health assessment and planning process conducted every five years by local health jurisdictions in Illinois. A**

group of McLean County Health Department employees and health leaders from local partner agencies served as the Community Health Advisory Committee (CHAC). Group members—consisting of local hospitals, universities, and other health and volunteer agencies—analyzed data collected from a variety of sources for more than



a year to assess the health problems for which McLean County residents are at highest risk.

The analysis by the health department and community partners determined

obesity, access to mental health services, and oral health as the top priority health concerns in McLean County. CHAC members were broken into taskforces for each priority to create community interventions over the next five years to improve health outcomes of McLean County residents.

**The health department spearheaded the 2012 McLean County Disaster Council Emergency Exercise**, which involved 15 participating organizations, including MCHD, Advocate BroMenn Medical Center, OSF St. Joseph Medical



Center, McLean County Emergency Management Agency, State Farm Insurance, and the Town of Normal. The purpose of the full-scale exercise was to respond to a scenario in which a domestic terrorist released inhalational anthrax in the Illinois State University (ISU) Bone Student Center.

The health department established a public Point of Dispensing site at the U.S. Cellular Coliseum in Bloomington to distribute prophylactic medicines to residents potentially exposed to inhalational anthrax. More than 150 volunteers from MCHD, McLean County Medical Reserve Corps, American Red Cross of the Heartland, students from Mennonite College of Nursing at ISU, and the Retired and Senior Volunteer Program acted as POD staff, evaluators, and role players.



**The McLean County Health Department was awarded \$200,000 from the Illinois Department of Public Health to administer the We Choose Health Grant.** The

health department designated \$96,000 to community coalitions to implement four components of the We Choose Health initiative, including: Coordinated School Model, Worksite Wellness, Smoke-Free Public Places and Smoke-Free Multi-Unit Housing.



Coordinated School Health is designed to prioritize health-enhancing behaviors and reduce health-risk behaviors at school and at home. Coordinated School Health grant recipients included Bloomington School District 87, McLean County Unit 5 School District, and Leroy School District.

Worksite Wellness implements sustainable policies to improve work settings by promoting healthy living, nutrition, physical activity, smoking cessation, and weight and disease management. Worksite Wellness grant recipients included Illinois State University, Heartland Community College, Flextech Inc., Heritage Enterprise, Bloomington-Normal YMCA, and the McLean County Chamber of Commerce.

Smoke-Free Public Places aims to protect citizens from tobacco smoke by prohibiting cigarette use in areas that are not yet covered by the Smoke-Free Illinois Act. The grant recipient for Smoke-Free Public Places was Illinois State University to promote its smoke-free central quad.

local non-profit hospitals conducting community health needs assessments under IRS guidance of the Affordable Care Act (ACA). These new mandates for tax exempt hospitals tied perfectly with the sustained requirements of an Illinois Plan for the Local Assessment of Need (IPLAN) for public health certification. Together, a more unified community health strategy started to emerge.

The newly formulated IPLAN Community Health Advisory Committee included representatives from both local hospitals and numerous community constituents determined to meld the three needs assessment findings into a cooperative community plan to address local health problem priorities. This cooperative process will continue in 2013 and beyond, whereby strategies to address these needs will continue to be created.

More community connections were evidenced in 2012 by partnering with local coalitions to attract newly available federal funding through the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) We Choose Health Grant, part of the Community Transformation Grant from the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). This successful funding initiative will bring \$200,000 per year for the next four years to support chronic disease interventions in the community. Partnerships with community coalitions will implement four components of We Choose Health: Coordinated School Health, Worksite Wellness, Smoke-Free Multi-Unit Housing and Smoke-Free Public Places.

Additional examples of cooperative partnerships can be found throughout the health and human service community of McLean County. As the Health Department continues to plan for the inevitable changes on the horizon resulting from continued implementation of the ACA, greater and more expanded connections to the community will emerge. It is only through these cooperative efforts and community partnerships that McLean County will continue to supply local solutions to local challenges.

A connected community is a partnership in action. The McLean County Health Department and its partners are committed to the needs of our community, and we are determined to promote and protect the health of county residents.

## 2012 Public Health Award
