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# A MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

I AM PROUD TO PRESENT the 2013 Annual Report for the McLean County Health Department. In addition to providing public health services in McLean County, we spent a significant amount of time in 2013 focusing on the future direction of our organization. As the Affordable Care Act (ACA) continued to roll out, despite the apparent hiccups, the Health Department worked at implementing the ACA to improve health overall.

Public Health, or population-based health improvement, has always been designed around the concept of implementing effective strategies to meet the health care needs of our communities. As the ACA unfolds and more strategies are unveiled to meet health care needs in the most cost efficient means possible, the McLean County Health Department has taken advantage of several new opportunities to assure the best health conditions exist in our community.

FY 2013 brought several new initiatives to our community through the Affordable Care Act, including expanding access to services for individuals not currently enrolled in Medicaid or possessing private

insurance coverage for health care. The Health Department coordinated with local partners to enroll eligible residents in the Illinois Health Insurance Marketplace and assist others to take advantage of the expanded Illinois Medicaid program.

The Health Department also extended its reach in making health care services more available and affordable by participating in a pilot project to accept most private insurance payments for our covered services, including immunizations, screenings, and assessments.

Our dental program welcomed three new dentists in 2013 that allowed us to expand access to restorative dental services for children, continue emergency dental pain-relief treatment for adult residents, and coordinate dental services in McLean County schools through a long standing partnership with a school-based dental program.

Throughout 2013, the Health Department continued to prevent and control population-based disease through the implementation of partnership approaches to our Maternal Child, Environmental, Community Health and Health Promotion services, as evidenced by the divisions narratives summarized in this annual report.

I would like to thank the Board of Health, the McLean County Board, and our community partners for their assistance in our efforts to provide a more cost-effective and comprehensive community health system, and I look forward to expanding those efforts in 2014.

## In-Person Counseling

The McLean County Health Department was one of 80 local health departments funded through a partnership with the Illinois Association of Public Health Administrators to assist Affordable Care Act implementation, specifically the enrollment of individuals in expanded Illinois Medicaid and Illinois Health Insurance Marketplace, also known as Get Covered Illinois. In-Person Counseling staff at the health department partnered with LIFE Center for Independent Living and Chestnut Health Systems, agencies that also had certified

In-Person Counselors or Navigators, to reach as many uninsured McLean County residents as possible. Educational presentations and targeted enrollment sessions occurred through collaboration with churches, human service agencies, schools, colleges and universities, county and city government, health care systems, medical clinics, and libraries. From October 1 to December 31, In-Person Counselors assisted and enrolled more than 300 individuals, providing them with affordable health insurance.

## Immunizations

For many residents, the immunization Clinic is the gateway to health care in the community. After addressing vaccination needs, immunization nursing staff often redirects clients to additional health department services or outside resources. Immunization staff is often asked to step in as the local vaccine expert by educating school nurses and physician office staff about proper vaccine storage and handling requirements, absorbing immunization clients of local physician offices during vaccine shortages, providing supporting documentation to help health care partners improve vaccine storage equipment, and answering questions about the state immunization information system. Administration and immunization staff also created the framework required to accept private insurance beginning in 2014.

## Health Promotion

The We Choose Health Grant from the Illinois Department of Public Health continued to support wellness initiatives in four key areas: the adoption of Coordinated School Health principles in McLean County schools, inclusion of worksite wellness policies in local small businesses to improve employee health, initiation of the process for OSF St. Joseph Medical Center Obstetrics Department to receive Baby Friendly Hospital designation, and the devel-

opment of smoke-free policies within multi-unit housing facilities. The Illinois Tobacco-Free Communities grant transitioned away from the long-standing tobacco prevention education program, known as Tar Wars, and moved to Media Detective—an evidence-based school program that teaches children how to decode messages in alcohol and tobacco advertising.

## Family Case Management

McLean County ranks fourth highest in Illinois for poor Medicaid birth outcomes, so McLean County Family Case Management was chosen as a pilot site for Intensive Prenatal Case Management-Better Birth Outcomes Program. Through the new program, staff worked closely with clients on a monthly basis, or more often as needed, to ensure medical care coordination, referrals to needed community services, prenatal health education, and transportation assistance. Family Case Management provided transportation assistance to more than 100 women in the form of bus passes, gas cards and taxi service to access specialty prenatal care.

## WIC

The Women, Infants & Children Nutrition, Education & Supplemental Food Program transitioned from appointment-only to walk-in clinic to allow families to stop by for WIC services at a time that is convenient for them, which was especially helpful to families with transportation difficulties. WIC also held its first off-site Breastfeeding Friends Fair at the Baby Fold, reaching 179 individuals to provide breastfeeding education. Illinois WIC sustained day-to-day program functions despite the two-week federal government shutdown, allowing McLean County WIC to continue supplying vouchers to families for nutritious foods through local food vendors, and other program benefits such as nutrition education, breastfeeding support, and referrals to community resources.

## Health Works

HealthWorks Lead Agency of Illinois is in place to assure children in the care of the Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS) have access to health care services. HealthWorks staff at the McLean County Health Department recruited Immanuel Health Center as a new health

service location for children in the care of DCFS. HealthWorks also worked with DCFS to get health department staff to present on infant safety for two different events hosted by The Baby Fold, Children's Home + Aid, and the Center for Youth and Family Solutions.

## AOK

The All Our Kids Network (AOK), in collaboration with the McLean County Health Department, John M. Scott Health Resources Center, McLean County Wellness Coalition, McLean County Center for Human Services, and the Illinois Prairie Community Foundation, organized a Bridges Out of Poverty professional development training at the Chateau Hotel and Conference Center in Bloomington. The presenter, Terie Dreussi-Smith, helped more than 300 participants develop further understanding of the obstacles experienced by individuals and families who live in poverty and encourage them to consider how their program policies and procedures could be adjusted to better assist families.

## Environmental Health

The Environmental Health Division improved its West Nile Virus (WNV) surveillance program by updating its mosquito batch testing process. The more sensitive test not only screens for positive mosquito pools more accurately, but is capable of testing birds suspected of WNV infection prior to being sent to a laboratory for lengthy testing. This feature allows the health department to quickly notify residents of WNV presence within the community. Changes to the state sewage code in 2013, as recommended by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, resulted in significant modification to the health department's sewage program, which will be in full effect in 2014.

## Emergency Preparedness

The Emergency Preparedness team partnered with the Mennonite College of Nursing at Illinois State University to conduct a flu vaccine survey. The survey required outreach to eight retail outlets in McLean County, creating the opportunity for new emergency preparedness partnerships with private businesses. As a member of the Access and Functional Needs Advisory Panel, the Health Department Emergency Preparedness team worked with other partners to provide an information luncheon to human service agencies about the importance and ongoing success of the McLean County Functional Needs Registry. The health department also participated in the McLean County Disaster Council annual emergency exercise by providing volunteer management and moulage.

## Dental

The Dental Clinic at the health department welcomed three new dentists in 2013. Dr. James Chow joined existing health department adult dentist Dr. Jerome Mitchell to provide dental services to adults on Fridays. Dr. Allison Beehner and Dr. Cheon Yoon joined existing health department children's dentist Dr. Diane Caruso to provide two dentists on Wednesdays, allowing for more than 40 additional children to receive restorative dental services each month. The Children's Dental Clinic gave case management and follow-up care for children who receive preventative dental services in McLean County schools from Orland Park Dental Services, providing treatment assessment and urgent care for local families.

## Communicable Disease

The Sexually Transmitted Disease (STD) and Tuberculosis (TB) screening programs within the Communicable Disease Section instituted new fee structures. The STD Clinic instituted a baseline fee, as opposed to the previous service-specific fee. The TB Clinic created a voucher program for employers requiring TB testing of employees. Shortages of Tubersol for screening tests and medications for treatment persisted nationally in 2013. The TB Clinic adopted a new treatment regimen for latent TB infection that required reduced staff time and quicker client completion than the previous treatment regimen, resulting in increased client compliance.

## Animal Control

McLean County Animal Control increased its community outreach partnerships and adoption promotion in 2013. In the spring, Animal Control staff provided Epiphany Grade School sixth-grade students a tour of the Animal Control Center and assisted the Bloomington Police Department as it revised its Animal Control Ordinance. In July, adoptable animals were promoted on the McLean County Health Department's website and social media accounts. In addition to ongoing rabies prevention presentations, Animal Control staff attended Operation Canine Rescue in August to promote the program's services. Animal Control also transitioned away from the use of the Carbon Monoxide Chamber, which was previously utilized only for euthanasia of aggressive animals, to the use of lethal injections for all euthanasia. The chamber was dismantled and removed from the facility in December. McLean County Animal Control ended the year by hosting a meeting for area veterinarians to discuss current issues and provide program updates.







# Awards

## McLean County Public Health Award

Mike McCurdy, news director of GLT Radio, was named the recipient of the 21st annual McLean County Public Health Award for his direct involvement with the Good-to-Go program, an ongoing community wide project of GLT and Illinois State University Office of Sustainability. The program encourages people to commute to work, shop, or enjoy their time by walking, bike-riding, car-pooling or bus riding, shining light on possible calories burned, gallons of gas saved, and carbon dioxide emissions avoided by promoting the use of alternative transportation, besides driving cars. As co-director and driving force of the Good-to-Go program, McCurdy helps people become more active, thus decreasing the health risks associated with sedentary lifestyle.



## Employee of the Year

Public Health Communication Specialist Kera Brossette was chosen as the 2013 McLean County Health Department Alice J. Olsson Memorial Employee of the Year. During the past two years as media spokesperson, Brossette worked to embed herself in all divisions of the health department to ensure a well-rounded understanding of key public health messages and job functions, while also assuring all public health messages are accurate and meet departmental priorities.
