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Divisions



Environmental Health

The adage that when public health works, nothing happens is a truism the Environmental Health Division strives to uphold. Environmental Health (EH) is one of many divisions within the health department that quietly performs daily activities to protect residents and visitors from the risk of illness.

2014 brought with it several significant changes to the way the division conducts business. A transition from paper-based food inspection processes to an electronic inspection and reporting system has benefits for both the department and clients by improving the consistency

and clarity of reports, speeding up the reporting process and streamlining data processing. In 2014, the division also amended the county's 13 year-old geo-thermal system ordinance to maintain authority to regulate closed loop wells and other geo-thermal systems as necessitated by the Illinois Department of Public Health's amendment of the state Water Well code in 2013.

For the first time in five years the division is operating at full staffing with eight field staff providing environmental health services for over 170,000 people living within a nearly 1,186 square mile radius.



Did you know? In addition to food inspections, Environmental Health inspects: tanning spas, water wells, septic systems, geo-thermal systems, restaurant building plans and conducts West Nile Virus surveillance.

In-Person Counseling

In harmony with the McLean County Health Department's mission, the In-Person Counselor (IPC) Program strives to assure that conditions are conducive to good health. To meet their goals, the IPCs focus on three key activities: educating the community about the key elements of the Affordable Care Act and the nuances of the health insurance marketplace; leading community-wide efforts to support health reform efforts; and, protecting McLean County residents by ensuring that they have access to health coverage.

In 2014, IPCs were able to assist 413

individuals and families enroll in Medicaid and help another 211 people complete health insurance marketplace enrollments. Not included in those numbers are the many residents IPCs assisted through consultation and linkage to other agencies providing enrollment services.

Through outreach events and successful partnerships, the IPC's increased awareness of the IPC Program and successfully reached residents in multiple income ranges and from many different cultures and linguistic backgrounds.



Did you know? At the conclusion of the first grant year, the IPC Program was selected by Get Covered Illinois to present best practices at the IPC Institute – a one-day conference for central and downstate IPCs.



Did you know? Illinois is the only state in the nation that requires daily physical education for students. Health Promotion staff helped physical education teachers keep their students moving by training them to use the highly-active, research-based SPARK PE curriculum.

Health Promotion

Health Promotion (HP) helps make the healthy choice, the easy choice for residents of McLean County through education, advocacy and collaboration.

Through education, the department helps deliver accurate and timely information about current health issues and ongoing chronic conditions such as cardiovascular disease and cancer, to both clients and the community. To further encourage healthy habits and promote the prevention of illness and disease, a variety of materials are produced by HP staff that address a full range of topics such as, immunizations, children’s dental health and smoking cessation.

HP also focuses on advocating for and enforcing system-level policies that create healthier living environ-

ments. HP has been actively involved in the development of local health policies, such as the major effort to make Bloomington/Normal smoke-free. This involvement continues as HP now helps to enforce those policies in local restaurants, bars and other businesses, through the Illinois Tobacco-free Communities Grant.

Collaboratively, HP staff work strategically with instrumental organizations for the betterment of the county. These collaborative efforts have resulted in staff members being involved in the assessment of health in the county through IPLAN task forces and having a voice in the development and implementation of the Community Health Plan (a product of the Illinois Project for Local Assessment of Need).

Community Health Services

The Community Health Services Division helps improve the health of McLean County residents by offering information and services regarding immunizations, communicable disease surveillance, dental and vision care, emergency preparedness, confidential STD and HIV testing, home nursing and animal control.

Animal Control

In 2014 the Animal Control Program and its staff received new certifications and licensures, while carrying out its mission to prevent and control rabies in McLean County. Over 500 bite reports were investigated and, in conjunction with the CD program staff, 27 individuals received post-exposure prophylaxis to reduce the risk of rabies after being bitten by an animal.

In June, the County Board decided to move the Animal Control Program back to the County Administrator’s Office by the end of the year. This transition required countless meetings as staff had to be trained in areas of support that had previously been supplied by the health department. A successful transition was achieved on January 1, 2015.



Did you know? 32 dogs and 43 cats found forever homes through the Animal Control Center’s adoption program in 2014. An additional 91 dogs and 131 cats were transferred to rescue facilities throughout Central Illinois.

Communicable Disease

Though nearly 5000 miles away, the Communicable Disease program felt the effects of the Ebola epidemic in West Africa in the fall of 2014 as the health department had to establish readiness to respond if a traveler from an Ebola-stricken country was to arrive in McLean County and need to be monitored or receive medical care. Working with information from the CDC and IDPH, health department staff rallied the support of local partners and developed internal protocols, monitored changes in

recommendations, provided rumor control, and responded to many requests for Ebola-related presentations and media interviews. In 2014, the CD staff also contended with a MRSA outbreak, latent TB cases and the implementation of several new services including: the flu outreach program, fit testing for N95 respirators, titer checks, adult immunizations (for those with insurance or self-pay in addition to Medicaid), and pregnancy testing.



Did you know? Chlamydia is the most commonly reported disease in Illinois. Of the 67,000 cases reported per year in Illinois, 859 were from McLean County.

Emergency Preparedness

In November of 2014, the Bioterrorism and Public Health Emergency Planning and Response Program organized and hosted a Disaster Mental Health Conference attended by nearly 100 healthcare and mental health professionals and volunteers from throughout central Illinois. The team also responded to nearly twice as many requests for children's outreach programs and accepted an invitation to present a workshop at

the National Public Health Preparedness Summit in Atlanta, Georgia about the role of the local health department in a nuclear incident.

The first Ebola death in the U.S. prompted the team and health department staff to activate a modified Incident Command staff and hold a series of planning conferences with key community stakeholder groups.



Did you know? Bioterrorism and Public Health Emergency Planning works with local day camps every summer to present preparedness programs for children.



Did you know? Most diseases prevented by vaccines are no longer common in the United States. If vaccines weren't used, just a few cases could quickly turn into tens or hundreds of thousands.

Immunizations

It is the goal of the Immunization Program (IP) to promote health and prevent vaccine preventable illness through vaccination in a safe, comprehensive, convenient, and caring manner. New in 2014, the program opened its doors to an expanded audience with the launch of the Billable Immunization Program.

For the first time, the health department was able to bill private insurance and accept self-pay for adults and children who were not eligible for Vaccines For Children (VFC) services. The program quickly blossomed from providing only nine vaccines to private insurance or self-pay individuals in January, to providing 95 immunizations through

the billable program in October. By the end of the year, 373 individuals had come to the health department and received 555 vaccinations in this new program along with an additional 1,361 individuals who received their flu vaccinations at health department-staffed outreach clinics.

Additionally in January, Phase 2 of the ICARE statewide Immunization Registry was launched for local health departments. Non-Chicago VFC medical providers joined in April. During the transition to the computerized inventory system, the IP stepped in to help vaccinate additional VFC eligible clients while other local VFC providers worked through the transition.



Did you know? Each year over half of children on Medicaid do not utilize dental services, even though there is no-out-of-pocket expense to the parent or guardian.

Dental

The Dental Program assures access to healthcare for the underserved population. The program accepts Medicaid as payment, with no out-of-pocket costs for families.

In July, the state legislature restored covered dental services for adult clients with Medicaid. Prior to this change, dental services to adults were limited to emergency extractions. With more services covered,

the dental program saw an increase in services provided to adults during the Friday clinics.

The children's dental clinic continued to provide services four days per week for children with Medicaid. With preventable cavities appearing even in toddlers, there has been renewed focus placed on educating parents about the importance of early and routine oral health care.

Maternal Child Health Services

The Maternal Child Health Services Division promotes healthy lifestyles to its families and works to empower families to identify health and social needs and utilize health care and community resources. Through these efforts, the division helps protect the most vulnerable of McLean County's population.

Family Case Management

Family Case Management (FCM) seeks to reduce pre-term births and infant mortality by connecting expectant mothers with appropriate medical care, needed community resources, family support, and education.

In 2014, FCM saw the continuation of the Intensive Prenatal Case Management/Better Birth Outcomes Program (IPCM/BBO) that had been piloted at the health department in 2013. Due to the success in IPCM/BBO enrollment and the increasing caseload, FCM received a mid-year funding increase which allowed them to assist an additional 60 women. FCM also enhanced their

ability to case manage participants with mental health issues, thanks to several mental health trainings they were able to attend.

Medicaid Managed Care plan options grew in 2014 and the FCM staff found themselves on the receiving end of many questions from confused participants and providers. Residents' who weren't eligible to receive Medicaid coverage in the past, suddenly were able to get coverage and needed assistance making the best plan choice for their families. The rollout allowed FCM to collaborate more closely with program participants, physicians and hospital partners.



Did you know? Over 53% of births in Illinois are paid for by Medicaid; however, many women lose their Medicaid coverage shortly after the children are born. Family Case Management helps women without medical coverage decrease poor pregnancy outcomes and have healthier families by linking them with local services that can address their health and family planning needs.

HealthWorks

HealthWorks Lead Agency (HWLA) of Illinois enforces guidelines pertaining to the health of children in the care of the Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS) and assures access to health care services. In 2014, three staff members from the Maternal Child Health Services Division were cross-trained

as HWLA backup office support staff. A review of the continuation of operation plan also prompted the request for a Memorandum of Understanding to maintain the continuation of services through the DCFS internet system in the event that HWLA needed to be temporarily housed at an external location.



Did you know? WIC received a \$1000 grant from Share Our Strength's Cooking Matters at the Store, to do grocery store tours aimed at teaching WIC clients important food skills so that they can select the best foods and identify the best values available to them with their WIC food instruments.

WIC

In 2014, the National Women Infants and Children (WIC) program celebrated its 40th anniversary. The McLean County Health Department WIC staff celebrated the milestone both locally (with community partners), and at the Statewide conference in Springfield.

WIC also served as a pilot agency for the grant funded, "WIC to 5" project

which was developed in cooperation with the University of Illinois at Chicago. The project explored ways to retain children in the WIC program beyond their first year. Involvement in this pilot led to the health department's WIC being included in a research presentation made at the National WIC Conference in Pittsburgh, PA.



AOK

The All Our Kids Early Childhood Network (AOK) is focused on supporting and improving the Early Childhood system of services in McLean County. Specifically, the AOK Network's plan includes initiatives centered on mental health for young children and their families, babies born healthy, and parent support.

One of the new roles the AOK Network has recently accepted is representing the birth to five-year-old voice on the IPLAN Mental Health Task Force. Acting in this role, the AOK Network has helped establish the Mental Health First Aid Team. In 2014, five Mental Health First Aid training courses were put

on by the team, training about 135 individuals in either adult or youth mental health first aid. The AOK Network also assisted the League of Women Voters in their mental health study and efforts to maintain a continued focus on systems change in the mental health field.

Parent support efforts centered on participation in several community collaborative efforts offering both direct education and family fun events for parents of very young children. The AOK Network coordinated or participated in five family fun events and four parent education events reaching almost 650 parents and children in a variety of settings.
