MS. WALLEY: Good evening, ladies and

3 gentlemen. We are still at the testimony portion of

- 4 our evidentiary hearing, so what we are doing is
- 5 going through the list of sign-ups. We will cycle
- 6 through that one last time. We will then have an
- 7 opportunity for brief rebuttal testimony, if that is
- 8 exercised. If not, then we will have closing
- 9 arguments, and we can talk about that a little bit
- 10 as we get closer to that.
- For right now we are just going to go
- 12 through the sign-up sheet and make sure that anyone
- 13 that is here that signed up to testify and wants to
- 14 testify can do so.
- MR. DICK: Dan Deneen?
- 16 **MR. DENEEN:** Here.
- MR. DICK: Do you want to come up and
- **18** testify?
- MR. DENEEN: Who would be getting copies
- 20 of the exhibit?
- MR. DICK: One for the exhibit and one for
- 22 each of the zoning board.
- MS. WALLEY: Do you need copies made?
- MR. DENEEN: I have copies. Angelo

- 1 am wearing is Parkland's Foundation President.
- 2 Parkland's Foundation is a not-for-profit
- 3 organization that provides a very valuable resource
- 4 for the community. It is a public resource and open
- 5 to the public although it is 100 percent private.
- 6 Parkland's Foundation has approximately 3500 to
- 7 4000 acres of conservation ground in McLean and
- 8 Woodford County.
- 9 I have given you the resolution by the
- 10 Parkland Foundation Board. The Parkland Foundation
- 11 does not support or oppose the Invenergy McLean Wind
- 12 Energy Center. Parkland's Foundation supports all
- 13 of the Illinois Department of Natural Resources'
- 14 recommendations in effect at time of vote by the
- 15 Zoning Board of Appeal or McLean County Board as a
- 16 condition of approval, especially including a one
- 17 half mile setback from the Mackinaw River as well as
- 18 all of Heinlein Creek including within the INAI
- 19 designation for any wind turbine.
- 20 And I will comment first on the
- 21 environmental factors. The county has in its
- ordinances support for the IDNR positions.
- The IDNR recommendations must be honored
- 24 except for credible evidence otherwise.

- 2 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: Would you like to be
- 3 sworn in or affirmed?
- 4 MR. DENEEN: Sworn.
- 5 (MR. DENEEN PLACED UNDER OATH.)
- 6 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Would you state your
- 7 name and address and spell your last name for the
- 8 record?
- 9 **MR. DENEEN:** Daniel Deneen, D-e-n-e-e-n,
- 10 2219 West Oakland Avenue, Bloomington, Illinois.
- 11 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Thank you. Go ahead.
- **MR. DENEEN:** Okay. I am here, and I am
- 13 wearing two hats today.
- **MS. WALLEY:** Mr. Deneen, I am sorry.
- 15 Before you start, did you want to be qualified as an 16 expert?
- 17 MR. DENEEN: No.
- **MS. WALLEY:** Okay. I just wanted to
- 19 verify that.
- 20 (NEUTRAL EXHIBIT NO. 7 PARKLAND
- 21 RESOLUTION.
- MR. DICK: We'll call your exhibit,
- 23 Mr. Deneen, Neutral Exhibit 7.
- MR. DENEEN: Thank you. The first hat I

- And you have the different resolutions. I
- 2 won't go into them. I know you want to get out of
- 3 here quickly.
- 4 I will state, though, when I first
- 5 questioned Mr. Parzyck, he tried to evade the
- 6 answers. He didn't know the standards. He didn't
- 7 provide credible evidence. He was upset when I
- 8 asked him what credible evidence he had. I do not
- 9 believe they have given credible evidence for any of
- 10 the factors, so I would ask the board to make -- the
- 11 zoning board to make a recommendation to the full
- 12 board that it accept all the IDNR recommendations.
 - I was further incensed when Angelo
- 14 Capparella was up here. He was attacked. The
- 15 burden of proof was on Invenergy to provide credible
- 16 evidence; instead, Mr. Griffin kept asking him
- 17 questions that Ms. Walley said were improper later
- 18 on in this proceeding. He kept asking Angelo, "Are
- 19 you aware?" And he would say something. How could
- 20 he be aware of a study that was not in the record?
- 21 They could have provided the credible evidence.
- 22 They didn't.
- So, on behalf of Parkland's foundation, we
- 24 would ask to protect this because Parkland's

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- 1 foundation has an ecological wildlife oasis in the
- 2 middle of what's basically an ecological desert
- 3 because of farm ground and other things, not that I
- 4 oppose farm ground.
- 5 I will take off my hat for Parkland and
- 6 testify privately now. This will surprise
- 7 Mr. Griffin and Mr. Parzyck, but I am in support of
- 8 a wind farm. Coal is dead, oil is dying, and other
- 9 factors.
- 10 Alternative energy sources and
- 11 conservation are increasing more so in the rest of
- 12 the world than they are here. We need to get behind
- 13 it.
- However, that being said, it is for this
- 15 zoning board and county board to protect its
- 16 citizens from just taking a project at face value
- 17 and saying we will accept your money, build this
- 18 project.
- You've heard numerous comments in other
- 20 areas, but they are trying to get as many turbines
- 21 as they can in different areas.
- I will just comment briefly on the most
- 23 important area, and that is noise, which a lot of
- 24 the people are here about.

- 1 computer model and readjust. The first are what
- 2 they call the participating people; and the
- 3 participating people, they should be protected by
- 4 the 1500-foot minimum standard which should get you
- 5 to about a 39-decibel level unadjusted.
- 6 But for the nonparticipating persons, the
- 7 ones who aren't asking for a wind farm, the ones who
- 8 are not getting paid a nice amount, then you should
- 9 be much, much more conservative. I would suggest --
- 10 I'll leave it to you, and you'll probably debate it
- 11 but, I believe they should have at least a 3-decibel
- 12 cushion. If their expert was willing to throw out 2
- 13 decibels, I think it's only fair that you protect
- 14 them with about 3 decibels below the Illinois
- 15 Pollution Control Board standards. That would
- 16 result I believe in 23 percent less noise energy --
- 17 not energy -- loudness. That might not be exact,
- 18 but anyone can go to the Internet and see it's in
- 19 the 20 to 25 percent range.
- Their expert was correct. I'm not going
- 21 to give an estimate as to whether you need to
- 22 stretch that to 1750, 1800 feet or more. But their
- 23 expert was correct in it depends on how far away
- 24 from the turbine, the further away from the turbine

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- The board must look towards the health,
- 2 safety, and welfare of the citizens in this
- 3 community. First, I would say you need to take a
- 4 look also what is objective and what is subjective.
- 5 Mr. Hartke might have been a little too subjective,
- 6 but you get to objective on some of the other
- 7 information.
- 8 ISO standards are objective. They are
- 9 from the people around the world who say this is the
- 10 best standards for wind farms.
- Subjective is their witness who said,
- 12 "Well, I don't really agree with their standards. I
- 13 want to knock two decibels off."
- I know at least four of you up there are
- 15 very familiar with noise standards. Two decibels is
- 16 a lot of noise standard. Three decibels increases
- 17 the energy, the noise power by a factor of double,
- and I believe the noise loudness is about 23 percent
- 19 more.
- So, on behalf of the people around the
- 21 community, be very, very conservative and protect
- 22 the people from the excess noise.
- I think you need to break things into two
- 24 different classes and ask them to go back to their

- 1 I believe the less -- the more affect you get with
- 2 it, but that could have been explained by their
- 3 expert instead of by a layman.
- 4 So I am not going to suggest a distance,
- 5 but they should have at least a 3-decibel cushion,
- 6 in my opinion, for the nonparticipating people.
- 7 For the Village of Lexington, City of
- 8 Lexington, I think it needs to be at least half a
- 9 mile because that is a community and you don't want
- 10 to restrict Lexington's expansion because they want
- 11 to lock them in with this.
- And then, just going back and to
- 13 summarize, really, you had the one exhibit, and you
- 14 saw it up there, turn all of the red areas with
- 15 houses green. The nonparticipating persons should
- 16 not be within the red zone, and the red zone should
- 17 not be calculated taking off 2 decibels but perhaps
- 18 adding 3 decibels to the standards. Go conservative
- 19 for these people.
- And one other thing that did come up that
- 21 I would suggest also, they talked about, if they do
- 22 build turbines too close to persons, they are going
- 23 to have to make adjustments. They have to turn them
- 24 on and off. They lose their productivity. I would

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- 1 suggest this board tell them to crunch their numbers
- 2 further and, instead of turning off turbines and
- 3 making adjustments just for nonparticipating
- 4 persons, put them a little further away. Thank you.
- 5 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Question from the 6 board?
- 7 (QUESTIONS BY THE BOARD:)
- 8 MS. TURNER: Dan, are you under the
- ${f 9}$ assumption that he took 2 decibels off of the
- 10 standard?
- 11 **MR. DENEEN:** Yeah. It's my understanding
- 12 that he took the ISO standard and he randomly --
- 13 well, he doesn't think it's randomly. He
- subjectively believes he doesn't fit the model.
- **MS. TURNER:** Right. I don't -- I think he
- was taking it off of his own model, is what he'ssaying, not off the standard but off his own model.
- 17 saying, not off the standard but off his own model.
- **18** Could that be possible?
- **MR. DENEEN:** You would have to ask him,
- 20 but I did hear quite clearly that he crunched the
- 21 numbers and he said, well, let's reduce it by 2
- 22 decibels. He did say, I did add in. I figured it
- 23 out to see if it was a parking lot, but there was no
- 24 discussion as to the magnitude of that deviation,

- 1 level, whatever that would be, so that they would
- 2 create less noise.
- 3 MR. DENEEN: My suggestion, to avoid
- 4 friction between nonparticipating residents and
- 5 Invenergy, instead of making their adjustments,
- 6 which cuts back on their productivity, and it will
- 7 be even more critical in the coming years if the
- 8 price of energy goes up, but the better practice
- 9 would be to move them away from the nonparticipating
- 10 persons. Maybe it's up to 1750; 250 feet added to
- 11 1500 would lower it not just one/sixth but probably
- **12** greater than that.
- I am not an expert in that area, but I do
- 14 understand the science. And when he stated, it's
- 15 dependent upon how far you are from the turbine.
- 16 That is a proper general statement, but I cannot
- 17 quantify it. If they pushed all the
- 18 nonparticipating persons to at least 1750 feet, I
- 19 think it would avoid friction a great amount, and I
- 20 believe that they would have the ability to do it in
- 21 their computer models when they plot these out.
- The one witness was very candid. He just
- 23 said I am not too concerned about the participating
- 24 persons; they made their choice. And I would agree

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- 1 and we don't know if it's more or less than 2
- 2 decibels.
- 3 MS. TURNER: Okay. I'll be sure to go
- 4 back and read that again.
- 5 MR. DENEEN: I wasn't able to attend all
- 6 the hearings, of course. I had other meetings,
- 7 other engagements, and I wasn't brought in until the 8 end.
- **MS. TURNER:** You're a lucky guy.
- MR. DENEEN: And, also, going with what
- 11 the school retired superintendent said, I am a
- 12 voluntarily person for Parkland.
- MR. ZIMMERMAN: For the record, my
- 14 partners in one of my businesses is the treasurer of
- 15 Parkland's organization, I believe she is still.
- MR. DENEEN: Yes. We haven't allowed her to exit.
- **MR. ZIMMERMAN:** What I am hearing you
- 19 suggest is that one of the possibilities, were we to
- 20 vote for this, that he would request that we
- 21 stipulate that we would have the applicant adjust or
- 22 program some of the turbines so that they would
- 23 reduce the sound for a particular period of time,
- 24 like at night have them shut off at the particular

- 1 with that.
- 2 MR. ZIMMERMAN: Thank you.
- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Any questions of **4** staff?
- 5 MR. DICK: No.
- 6 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Would anyone in the
- 7 audience have questions of this witness? They are
- 8 to come forward.
- 9 (QUESTIONS BY MS. SLEETER.)
- 10 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: State your name and
- 11 address.
- MS. SLEETER: My name is Laurie Sleeter,
- 13 S-l-e-e-t-e-r. My address is 23903 North 2900 East
- 14 Road, in Lexington.
- 15 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: Could you spell your
- 16 first name?
- 17 MS. SLEETER: L-a-u-r-i-e.
- 18 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: Go ahead.
- **MS. SLEETER:** Mr. Deneen, I was wondering,
- 20 you mentioned the IDNR recommendations for both the
- 21 Mackinaw River and Heinlein Creek?
- MR. DENEEN: Correct.
- MS. SLEETER: And the setback should be
- 24 their standard of 500 feet?

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- 1 MR. DENEEN: That's what IDNR recommended,
- 2 half mile from the Mackinaw River, and then I
- 3 believe most of the lower Heinlein Creek is a half
- 4 mile, but the upper water courses would be 500 feet.
- 5 **MS. SLEETER:** I am just wondering if on
- 6 your list, for the record, if you could also include
- 7 Patton Creek?
- 8 MR. DENEEN: I think that would be
- **9** considered definitely in the record as being one of
- 10 the recommendation 5's, 500 feet of perennial stream
- 11 having to pre-qualify. Certainly from the photo
- 12 that the gentleman provided, it isn't a
- 13 steep-pitched straight waterway.
- MS. SLEETER: Yes. Thank you. I
- 15 appreciate that. That's it.
- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Any other questions?
- 17 I think that's it. Thank you for your
- 18 time and patience over all the evenings. Thanks for
- 19 coming up.
- MR. DICK: David Klein?
- Dennis Bourgerie?
- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Would you like to be
- 23 sworn in or affirmed?
- MR. BOURGERIE: Sworn in.

- 1 my wife is 80 and I am 78 -- and the wind farm
- 2 revenue would benefit their lives very much.
- I had a conversation with Judd Stover,
- 4 III, who is a member of the town counsel of
- 5 Lexington just yesterday. He told me that the
- 6 Lexington school had two teachers retire recently.
- 7 They are not going to be replaced. The physics
- 8 courses for students are going to be discontinued.
- **9** This is a blow to science education in the Lexington
- Lo school district.
- By the way, I have 16 relatives who live
- 12 in the Lexington school district and seven children
- 13 who attend Lexington schools.
- People want to have a good school for
- 15 their children. If the school system deteriorates,
- 16 property values will go down and people don't want
- 17 to move into the community. I strongly support this
- 18 clean energy project. Thank you for allowing me to
- 19 speak before you.
- 20 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Any questions from the
- 21 board?
- 22 (QUESTIONS BY THE BOARD.)
- MS. TURNER: Do you currently still live
- 24 on your farm?

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- 1 (DENNIS BOURGERIE PLACED UNDER OATH.)
- 2 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: Would you state your
- 3 name and address and spell your last name?
- 4 MR. BOURGERIE: My first name is Dennis,
- 5 two N's. Last name is Bourgerie. It's a long one.
- 6 B- as in baseball, O-U-R-G as in Georgia, E-R-I-E:
- 7 I live at 1621 North School Street in Normal,
- 8 Illinois, with my wife Irene.
- 9 We've lived there for 38 years. I grew up
- 10 in Lexington. I graduated from Lexington Grade
- 11 School and from Lexington High School before
- **12** graduating from the University of Illinois.
- I am a little nervous.
- I own half of a farm with Judd Stover, who
- 15 owns the other half. He and his son Aaron farm the
- 16 property. I have owned my half of this property for 17 32 years.
- Full disclosure: We have signed a
- 19 contract with Invenergy.
- Over the past three years the farm income
- 21 has gone down, down, and land taxes have gone
- 22 up, up, up. So this sequence squeezes us
- 23 financially very much. We would like to leave
- 24 something for our two children when we pass away --

- MR. BOURGERIE: No. I live on 1621 North
- 2 School Street.
- 3 **MS. TURNER:** Sorry. I missed that. I was
- 4 looking at something else here. Thank you.
- 5 **MR. BOURGERIE:** Yes.
- 6 MR. DEAN: Does your tenant live on the
- 7 farm?
- 8 **MR. BOURGERIE:** There is no house on the
- 9 farm anymore. My co-owner is Judd Stover. He farms
- the farm with his son Aaron Stover.
- **MR. DEAN:** Do they live in the area?
- MR. BOURGERIE: They live in the Lexington
- 13 school district. I think Aaron lives within the
- 14 City of Lexington and Judd lives south of Lexington.
- **MR. DEAN:** Thank you.
- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Any questions? No questions from staff.
- Anyone in the audience have questions of
- 19 this witness? It looks like we have one.
 - (QUESTIONS BY MS. BACHMAN:)
- 21 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: State your name and address.
- MS. BACHMAN: My name is Lindsay Bachman,
- 24 B-a-c-h-m-a-n, 23479 East 2700 North Road,

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- 1 Lexington.
- 2 Just a little background: My husband and
- 3 I are going to be residing on a very much affected
- 4 nonparticipating residence should this all go
- 5 through.
- 6 My question for you is: You specifically
- 7 stated that you do not live near this project. Why
- 8 is it the responsibility of the people that do to
- 9 help you provide an inheritance for your family?
- I just want to understand where your logic is coming from.
- MR. BOURGERIE: Well, I believe this
- 13 project is environmentally safe. I believe it has
- 14 clean energy. It is our property. Normally you can
- 15 do what is legal with the property.
- MS. BACHMAN: I understand that. When you
- 17 went under contract with -- go ahead. I am sorry.
- **MR. BOURGERIE:** And I do hope that the
- 19 turbines will be as soft as going as possible.
- MS. BACHMAN: When you went under contract
- 21 with Invenergy, were you aware of how
- 22 nonparticipating residences could be affected by
- 23 what you are putting on your ground? Did they give
- 24 you any of that information?

- 1 name, Bourgerie?
- 2 MR. BOURGERIE: Yeah.
- 3 MS. SLEETER: Hi. Do you think the
- 4 turbines are the only way to save our school?
- 5 **MR. BOURGERIE:** I am not really an expert
- 6 on the financial system.
- 7 MS. SLEETER: Just in your opinion, do you
- 8 think it's the only way? Do you think our school
- 9 will close if we don't sign up or have the project
- 10 in place?
- MR. BOURGERIE: You mean just an opinion?
- MS. SLEETER: Uh-huh.
- MR. BOURGERIE: I think it will prevent
- 14 the school from deteriorating.
- MS. SLEETER: Do you know of other ways
- 16 that Lexingtonian residents have supported the
- 17 school?

- **MR. BOURGERIE:** By very high taxes.
 - MS. SLEETER: We had a vote --
- MR. BOURGERIE: I've had conversations
- 21 with people.
- MS. SLEETER: And you know about the tax
- 23 referendum that we voted for the school?
- MR. BOURGERIE: I am not familiar with it.

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- 1 MR. BOURGERIE: I would say no.
- 2 MS. BACHMAN: Okay. If you lived on your
- 3 farm and were going to be near this turbine, would
- 4 you be as willing to have it put on your ground as
- 5 you were living in Normal?
- 6 **MR. BOURGERIE:** Yes.
- 7 MS. BACHMAN: Okay. And just so I am
- 8 clear: You are -- it sounded like -- I understand
- 9 you are in support of the project but solely in this
- 10 for financial gain and to eventually benefit your
- 11 family?
- MR. BOURGERIE: Yes. We will receive
- 13 money from the turbine. The school district, as I
- 14 understand it, will also receive a lot of money from
- 15 these turbines.
- MS. BACHMAN: I think that is all the
- 17 questions that I have.
- **18 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Any other questions
- 19 for this witness? Come forward, please.
- 20 (QUESTIONS BY MS. SLEETER:)
- MS. SLEETER: Laurie Sleeter, 23903 North
- 22 2900 East Road, Lexington.
- This is really nerve wracking.
- Bourgerie, is that how you say your last

- **MS. SLEETER:** Okay. We did do that.
- 2 And do you think that all Lexington
- 3 residents, including myself, that live in the
- 4 country, do you think that we have been properly
- 5 notified about this project? As a landowner, you
- 6 were notified almost two years ago, correct?
- 7 **MR. BOURGERIE:** That sounds right.
- 8 MS. SLEETER: Do you think that all
- 9 Lexington residents were notified at that time or 10 since?
- 11 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** You don't have to
- 12 answer. If you know, otherwise don't. You don't
- 13 have to answer the question. I mean to the best of
- 14 your ability.
- **MR. BOURGERIE:** I don't know.
- **16 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Any other questions?
- 17 MS. SLEETER: Yes.
- Do you know anything about school
- 19 enrollment and how that affects the programs,
- 20 teachers, sports, do you know how that affects
- **21** Lexington schools?
- MR. BOURGERIE: I am not that involved
- 23 with the specifics of Lexington schools.
- MS. SLEETER: Okay. Thank you.

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- 1 **MR. BOURGERIE:** Thank you.
- **2 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Thank you.
- 3 Any other questions?
- 4 MR. DICK: Thank you for coming.
- 5 Lewis Lipscomb? Louise?
- 6 **MS. LIPSCOMB:** Lois.
- 7 MR. DICK: Lois. Sorry.
- 8 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Would you like to be
- **9** sworn in or affirmed?
- 10 (MS. LOIS LIPSCOMB PLACED UNDER OATH.)
- 11 MS. LIPSCOMB: Yes, please.
- 12 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: Would you state your
- 13 name and address and spell your last name?
- MS. LIPSCOMB: Lois, which is L-o-i-s,
- 15 Lipscomb, L-i-p-s-c-o-m-b, 342 Fieldcrest Court,
- 16 Normal, Illinois.
- As I have stated my name, my husband Frank
- 18 and our three daughters comprise the Warlow
- 19 Corporation. We own farmland east of the interstate
- 20 in the Lexington area.
- 21 When approached by Invenergy for the
- 22 possibility of a wind turbine on our land, we took
- 23 several weeks to research the company and also
- 24 connect with farm owners who have currently wind

- 1 MS. LIPSCOMB: None.
- 2 MS. TURNER: None. Okay.
- 3 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** You might have said
- 4 this, but I don't know. I missed it. Does some of
- 5 your family still farm the farm right now?
- 6 **MS. LIPSCOMB:** No, they do not.
- 7 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** You have it rented out 8 to people?
- 9 **MS. LIPSCOMB:** Yes, we do.
- 10 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Okay. Thank you.
- MR. DICK: How many turbines will you have
- 12 on your land?
- 13 **MS. LIPSCOMB:** Possibly one.
- MS. SLEETER: Possibly more? Possibly
- 15 none?
- MS. LIPSCOMB: That, I can't tell you. I
- 17 know there is a possibility of one.
- **18 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Okay. Thank you.
- MS. LIPSCOMB: I don't think it's gotten
- 20 to that point yet.
- 21 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: Would anyone in the
- 22 audience have questions of this witness?
- 23 (QUESTIONS BY MR. HUDSON.)
- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** I do need your name

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- 1 turbines on their land. We weighed the pros and
- 2 cons and then signed the Invenergy contact.
- 3 Obviously, the pros outweigh the cons.
- 4 We did not find any problems of the
- 5 magnitude which were described by Mr. Hartke on
- 6 Tuesday evening. On Tuesday evening, during the
- 7 question portion of Mr. Bertsche's testimony, the
- 8 comment was made that farming has its ups and downs
- 9 but you still made it, and he agreed with that.
- My parents farmed during their life and
- 11 they, too, made it. However, there were farm owners
- 12 in those downtimes who did not make it.
- Farming is currently in a downtime. Our
- 14 family felt adding a wind turbine to our land would
- 15 not only augment the farm income but produce much
- 16 needed electricity for our country. We actually
- 17 feel that we are being berated for signing the
- 18 contract with Invenergy. Farming is a business. A
- 19 business must make a profit to continue.
- 20 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Any questions from the
- 21 board?
- (QUESTIONS BY THE BOARD.)
- MS. TURNER: How many of your family
- 24 members are living close to the windmill?

- 1 and address and how to spell it.
- 2 MR. HUDSON: Jarrod Hudson, H-u-d-s-o-n.
- 3 Lexington, Illinois.
- 4 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: Could you give your
- address in Lexington, please?
- 6 **MR. HUDSON:** I believe, by state law, with
- 7 the Open Meetings Act, I am not required to. Thank
- 8 you.
- 9 MS. WALLEY: I am sorry. I just wanted to
- 10 let you know that is fine. You don't have to give
- 11 your physical address. It's like you said, it's not
- 12 necessarily an OMA issue, but it's important for the
- 13 board. It's a weight issue for testimony. They
- 14 want to make sure that, when they are considering
- 15 evidence, that they are looking at individuals from
- 16 our community that are testifying. So you certainly
- 17 don't have to, but I just wanted to make you aware
- 18 of that.
- MR. HUDSON: I'll give you the crossroads.
- MS. WALLEY: That's fine.
- MR. HUDSON: It's 2450 North Road and 3100
- **22** East.
- So you said a big reason that you signed
- 24 the contract with Invenergy is because of the hard

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- 1 times with farmers, prices are down, and it's hard
- 2 to make a living. I understand that. I work in
- 3 agriculture, so I know where you are coming from.
- 4 But you also made the comment that you
- 5 don't farm the ground yourself, that you rent it 6 out?
- 7 **MS. LIPSCOMB:** That is correct.
- 8 MR. HUDSON: Currently most renters are
- 9 not having a hardship the farmers have because they
- 10 do not have the cost involved. So is that money
- 11 really to help the farm or is it just for the money
- 12 in your pocket at the end of the day?
- MS. LIPSCOMB: I believe it's both.
- MR. HUDSON: How will the money from the
- 15 windmill help your farm, if you are not farming it?
- MS. LIPSCOMB: I am sorry. I can't answer that question.
- **MR. HUDSON:** Okay. That's all I've got.
- 19 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Thank you very much.
- 20 (QUESTIONS BY MS. DUZAN.)
- 21 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: Would you state your
- 22 name and address and spell your last name?
- MS. DUZAN: Kellie, K-e-l-l-i-e, Duzan,
- 24 D-u-z-a-n.

- 1 farm; am I correct?
- MS. LIPSCOMB: That is correct.
- 3 MS. DUZAN: So you are using this turbine
- 4 so that your business can do more than just make it?
- 5 **MS. LIPSCOMB:** Yeah.
- 6 MS. DUZAN: So a main question that I
- 7 have -- I am an RN.
- 8 MS. LIPSCOMB: So am I.
- 9 MS. DUZAN: Are you? It's a hard field,
- **10** isn't it?
- 11 MS. LIPSCOMB: Yes.
- MS. DUZAN: When I speak with patients, or
- 13 when I did speak with patients when I worked, there
 - .4 is a difference between surviving --
 - .5 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** We need to get down to
- 16 a question, though, if you would.
- 17 MS. DUZAN: Sure.
- I am comparing your make it and be
- 19 successful to a person who whose health is
- 20 surviving, getting by, and thriving as a healthy
- 21 individual.
- MS. LIPSCOMB: I really don't find the
- 23 comparison there and what we are trying to do here.
- 24 I am really sorry. I just --

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- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Can we have your address?
- 3 MS. DUZAN: Yeah. Sorry. 24322 North
- 4 2250 East Road, in Lexington, Illinois.
- 5 I just have a question for you. You
- 6 caught my attention when you described your
- 7 business, your farming business, and you said that
- 8 you needed to do more than just make it. You wanted
- 9 to have a thriving business; am I correct?
- 10 MS. LIPSCOMB: I guess I think you kind of
- 11 misconstrued what I said. Any business, whether
- 12 it's farming or not, has to make a profit in order
- 13 to keep viable.
- MS. DUZAN: Most definitely. My husband
- 15 is self-employed, so I do get that.
- 16 **MS. LIPSCOMB:** Right. Okay.
- MS. DUZAN: If somebody came in and
- 18 somehow made you change the way you ran your
- 19 business, and you could no longer thrive, you only
- 20 had a choice to make it, how would you feel?
- MS. LIPSCOMB: I really don't think that
- 22 pertains to what we're talking about here. I think
- 23 you've gotten off the subject.
- MS. DUZAN: Well, you don't live on your

- MS. DUZAN: So you don't feel like having
- 2 nonparticipating members in the pathway or the
- 3 affected area of your turbine will affect their
- 4 lifestyle and wellbeing and allow them what they
- 5 deserve?
- 6 **MS. LIPSCOMB:** I don't see how a turbine
- 7 is going to affect somebody's lifestyle.
- 8 MS. DUZAN: Really?
- 9 MS. LIPSCOMB: You know, I have an
- 10 opinion. You have an opinion. Obviously, we have
 - 1 different opinions.
- MS. DUZAN: Uh-huh. But would you agree
- that there is a difference between health wise
- 14 surviving and health wise thriving?
- **MS. LIPSCOMB:** Yes, there would be.
- MS. DUZAN: Okay. Thank you. That's all 17 I have.
- 18 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Thank you.
- 19 (QUESTIONS BY MS. WINTERLAND.)
- MS. WINTERLAND: Amy Winterland, 22825
- 21 North 3075 East Road, Colfax.
- MR. DICK: Would you spell your last name, please?
- MS. WINTERLAND: W-i-n-t-e-r-l-a-n-d.

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- 1 A-m-y.
- 2 So you said this turbine is going to
- 3 augment your farm income, correct?
- 4 MS. LIPSCOMB: That is our hope. That is
- 5 what we hope to have happen.
- 6 **MS. WINTERLAND:** So are you an active --
- 7 are you active farming or a passive farmer?
- 8 **MS. LIPSCOMB:** No. We have a -- Soy
- 9 Capital does the managing.
- **MS. WINTERLAND:** Farm manager?
- 11 MS. LIPSCOMB: Yes.
- MS. WINTERLAND: So are you sharing the
- 13 income you are getting from the turbine with the
- 14 person who is actually farming the ground?
- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** That is a personal
- 16 question. I don't think she has to answer that if
- 17 she doesn't want to.
- **MS. WINTERLAND:** Okay. So the person
- 19 farming the ground is paying cash rent. Did you
- 20 take into consideration the additional income you
- 21 are getting from the turbine when setting your cash
- **22** rent?
- MS. LIPSCOMB: I think you are way off of
- 24 the subject. I don't see somehow that is pertinent

- 1 MR. POWELL: Chenoa.
- 2 Sorry. I haven't had a chance to talk to
- 3 anybody that has signed with Invenergy yet. I was
- 4 kept in the dark about it pretty well. The reason
- 5 why I am asking this question is I am just
- 6 unfamiliar how the process worked.
- 7 At what point -- you said you live in
- 8 North Normal, right?
- 9 **MS. LIPSCOMB:** We do.
- MR. POWELL: At what point, when you were
- 11 signing with Invenergy, did you find out the size of
- 12 the wind turbine?
- MS. LIPSCOMB: I don't know. I don't
- 14 remember that. I am sorry.
- MR. POWELL: Were you basing any of your
- 16 decision on what you have seen in the White Oak Farm
- 17 in the size of those turbines?
- 18 MS. LIPSCOMB: No.
 - **MR. POWELL:** So the size of them didn't
- 20 matter to you?

19

- MS. LIPSCOMB: No. I didn't say it didn't
- 22 matter. I just wasn't aware.
- MR. POWELL: So, when you signed with
- 24 Invenergy, you did not know what size the wind

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- 1 with what I have said.
- 2 MS. WINTERLAND: Well --
- 3 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** You are into her
- 4 personal business. It's not relevant.
- 5 **MS. WINTERLAND:** Okay. I am just -- what
- 6 -- I was probably not saying this correctly, but --
- 7 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** No, you were.
- 8 **MS. WINTERLAND:** -- the farm income is the
- **9** farmer who is actually farming the ground. Okay.
- 10 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** That is a matter of
- 11 debate.
- MS. WINTERLAND: Okay. Sorry.
- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Any other questions?
- 14 Come forward.
- 15 (QUESTIONS BY MR. POWELL.)
- 16 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Name, address, spell 17 your last name.
- **MR. POWELL:** Jeff Powell, P-o-w-e-l-l.
- **19 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** And your address?
- **MR. POWELL:** 32897 East 2700 North.
- 21 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Could you repeat that,
- 22 please?
- MR. POWELL: 32897 North East 2700 North.
- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** In Lexington?

- 1 turbines would be?
- 2 MS. LIPSCOMB: I am sorry. I can't
- 3 remember that.
- 4 MR. POWELL: Okay. How do you feel about,
- 5 after signing with them, finding out that they will
- 6 be up to three times bigger than what is at White
- 7 Oak that you probably see every day?
- 8 MS. LIPSCOMB: I wasn't aware of that.
- 9 Sorry.
- MR. POWELL: Thank you. That is all I
- 11 have.

- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Any other questions?
 - Thanks for coming up.
- MR. DICK: Art Schlipf?
- 15 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Do you like to be
- 16 affirmed, is what you told me?
- 17 MR. SCHLIPF: Affirm.
- 18 (ARTHUR SCHLIPF PLACED UNDER OATH.)
- 19 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Would you state your
- 20 name and address and spell your last name?
- MR. SCHLIPF: Arthur Schlipf,
- 22 S-c-h-l-i-p-f, 21302 East 2950 North Road, Greeley,
- 23 Illinois.
- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** If you would -- I

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- 1 think we got it all. Go ahead.
- **MR. SCHLIPF:** I just wanted to state that
- 3 I'm in favor of the project. I feel that the
- 4 benefits to the schools, to the community, to the
- 5 county, to the landowners of this project are a
- 6 plus. Thank you. That is all I have.
- 7 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: And wait a minute.
- 8 Any questions from the board?
- 9 (QUESTIONS BY THE BOARD.)
- 10 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Do you farm your farm?
- MR. SCHLIPF: I help farm with my son. I
- 12 farm half and half.
- 13 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: So your farm is going
- 14 to be passed down to your son?
- 15 MR. SCHLIPF: Correct.
- 16 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** And you're a
- 17 participant, so you are going to get a windmill or
- 18 whatever?
- MR. SCHLIPF: Yeah, proposed to get one
- 20 windmill.
- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Okay. Thank you.
- Questions from the staff?
- 23 (QUESTIONS BY THE STAFF.)
- MR. DICK: Do you live on the same

- 1 also: (1) I am a vice-president trust officer and
- 2 farm manager for Heartland Bank, and I represent
- 3 five clients who have signed with Invenergy and will
- 4 have turbines. They are in support because of the
- 5 clean energy because of the increase in land values
- 6 that the turbines will bring and, yes, for the added
- 7 income so they can pass on the farm heritage to
- 8 their children.
- There has been a lot of conversations
- 10 about whether a landowner who doesn't live on the
- 11 farm has skin in the game like the tenant, and I
- 12 would just say, for a good piece of farmland that is
- 13 worth \$10,000, they stand to lose a couple thousand
- 14 dollars an acre in a downturn like we've seen in the
- 15 last couple years from the highs. They have a lot
- 16 of skin in the game. So, from that regard, my
- 17 clients are in support of the project.
- Personally, my family owns 320 acres in
- 19 Lawndale Township, and they have signed up and are
- 20 proposed to get two wind turbines. So they are --
- 21 my family is also in favor of the project.
- My family farms in Woodford and Tazwell
- 23 County. There haven't been any wind farms near my
- 24 home farm. It's just the population is far too

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- 1 property where this turbine is going to be located?
- 2 MR. SCHLIPF: Yes, I do.
- 3 MR. DICK: Are you concerned about it
- 4 being on your farm?
- 5 MR. SCHLIPF: No.
- 6 **MR. DICK:** Thank you.
- 7 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Any questions from the
- 8 audience for this witness?
- 9 You got by on the first trip.
- Call the next one, please.
- MR. DICK: Matt Wyss.
- 12 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: Would you like to be
- 13 sworn or affirmed?
- MR. WYSS: I'll affirm.
- 15 (MATT WYSS PLACED UNDER OATH.)
- 16 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: State your name and
- 17 address and spell your last name.
- **MR. WYSS:** Matt Wyss, W-y-s-s, 517 West
- 19 Sunset Drive, Eureka, Illinois.
- MR. DICK: Does Matt have two T's in it?
- MR. WYSS: It does.
- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** I think you can go
- 23 ahead.
- MR. WYSS: I am here wearing two hats

- 1 dense and apparently it's not a high wind area. But
- 2 if there were a turbine on my family's land, they
- 3 would allow me to quit my desk job and start in on
- 4 the farming operation. There is such a huge barrier
- 5 to entry right now; any extra income would help the
- 6 next generation of farmers get back involved in the
- 7 home farm.
- 8 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: Any questions from the
- **9** board?

13

- 10 (QUESTIONS BY THE BOARD.)
- 11 MS. TURNER: You said you have five
- 12 clients that you help manage the farm in that area?
 - MR. WYSS: I do, yes.
- MS. TURNER: Do any of them have families
- 15 who live on the farms where the turbines would be?
 - **MR. WYSS:** No. None of them do.
- **MR. ZIMMERMAN:** Do you have any family
- 18 that lives on the farms? You said there were two
- 19 proposed turbines?
- MR. WYSS: No. No family that lives
- 21 there.
- MS. TURNER: Now I want to talk to your
- 23 other hat.
- MR. WYSS: Sure.

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- 1 MS. TURNER: You said that the farm income
- 2 helps with the entry and that there is a big barrier
- 3 to entry at this point. Could you tell me a little
- 4 bit more about that?
- 5 **MR. WYSS:** Sure. For myself, coming out
- 6 of college, I knew I would not be able to jump into
- 7 the farming operation. My dad and my uncle farm
- 8 1400 acres together supporting two families. My dad
- 9 is not ready to retire. He's not really ready to
- 10 scale back. And if there was a wind turbine or two
- 11 on the farm providing income, he would be able to
- 12 scale back so that I would be able to take on some
- 13 of those acres and be able to farm.
- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** It looks like you are
- 15 kind of young. You got a little time here.
- MR. WYSS: I hope so.
- 17 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Give your dad a little
- 18 chance.
- Any questions from the staff?
- 20 (QUESTIONS BY THE STAFF.)
- MR. DICK: You said that as a family who
- 22 owns land, has skin in the game, what do you mean?
- MR. WYSS: Yes. I am saying, you know, a
- 24 couple years ago when good land was selling for

- CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: Would anyone in the
- 2 audience have questions?
- You might be a first.
- 4 (QUESTIONS BY MS. COTTER.)
- 5 **MS. COTTER:** Julie Hall Cotter, 23571
- 6 North 2900 East Road, Lexington, C-o-t-t-e-r.
- As having grown up in the farming
- community, and as a farmer, I also did. Obviously,
- 9 you are aware that part of farming is the ups and
- 10 downs?
- 11 MR. WYSS: Yes.
- MS. COTTER: And all of our ancestors,
- 13 mine included, have made it through the ups and
- 14 downs. That is part of the game?
- 15 MR. WYSS: Yes.
- MS. COTTER: Does it not bother your
- conscious at all that what you are doing is
- 18 affecting many other lives and children that have no
- 19 say so as to what you do?
- MR. WYSS: I believe in the right to do
- 21 what's legal on your property, whether that's a
- 22 confined hog operation or whether that is a grain
- 23 drying setup or whether that is a wind turbine.
- MS. COTTER: Most of us that chose to live

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- 1 13,000 or 14,000 an acre, and in some cases land is
- 2 still selling for that much, my point is, land
- 3 values have decreased quite a bit the last few years
- 4 from commodity highs. If you look at farmland
- 5 purely as an investment, which my clients don't,
- 6 they stand to lose 2 or 3000, maybe \$4,000 per acre,
- 7 whereas if you are a farmer and maybe you are paying
- 8 \$200 an acre cash rent, \$250 an acre cash rent, that
- 9 200 dollars/\$250 an acre is a whole lot different
- 10 than what the landowner stands to lose when land
- 11 values decrease.
- MR. DICK: Are these landowners in a
- 13 difficult situation then when this land is decreased
- 14 and the turbines put them in a much better position?
- 15 Is that what you are thinking?
- MR. WYSS: I don't think their personal
- 17 finances are important. I am just saying, if you
- 18 look at it stickily as an investment, they do have a
- 19 lot of skin in the game.
- And, you know, I don't know if Dave Klein
- 21 has testified yet. I know what his numbers say. I
- 22 am an appraiser. I know that a turbine adds between
- 23 1,000 and \$1,200 per acre on a lot of farms, and it
- 24 can really help offset some of those decreases.

- 1 in the country aren't offended by grain dryers or
- 2 hog setups.
- 3 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** It just has to be
- 4 questions, not testimony.
- 5 **MS. COTTER:** Okay. It doesn't bother your
- 6 conscious at all?
- 7 **MR. WYSS:** It doesn't.
- 8 **MS. COTTER:** That's all.
- 9 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Thank you.
- 10 (QUESTIONS BY MR. HUDSON.)
- 11 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: You have been here
- 12 once, so you know the drill.
- **MR. HUDSON:** Jared Hudson, H-u-d-s-o-n,
- 14 2450 North Road and 3100 East Road, Lexington,
- 15 Illinois.
- So you said part of the benefit for
- 17 farmers was if they are a landowner, because of land
- 18 prices and commodity prices, that will help offset.
- 19 Do you realize that farmers are able to dictate what
- 20 they buy that land for?
- MR. WYSS: Yes. I realize nobody is
- 22 forcing anybody to buy land at any price.
- MR. HUDSON: So, if a farmer makes a bad
- 24 business decision, should they get double subsidies

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- 1 to help make it?
- 2 MR. WYSS: No. I don't think so.
- 3 MR. HUDSON: So, if they shouldn't get
- 4 double subsidies -- they already get farming
- 5 subsidies from the government.
- 6 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** We are getting into
- 7 testimony again. Just a question.
- 8 MR. HUDSON: All right. I guess that is
- 9 it. Thank you.
- 10 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Any other questions?
- 11 We've got one more.
- 12 (QUESTIONS BY MR. JOLLY.)
- **MR. JOLLY:** Tim Jolley, 26759 East 2700
- 14 North Road, Chenoa. J-o-l-l-y.
- Have you discussed with the nearby
- 16 nonparticipants how this project would impact them?
- MR. WYSS: I have discussed it with a few.
- **18** Yes.
- MR. JOLLY: How close would they be
- 20 approximately to the turbine that is proposed?
- MR. WYSS: I don't know the exact
- 22 distance, but I think -- I don't know the exact
- 23 distance.
- MR. JOLLY: A mile?

- 1 MR. JOLLY: And that was because the
 - 2 commodity prices were extremely high at that time,
 - 3 correct?
 - **MR. WYSS:** Yeah, peeking in 2012, '13.
 - 5 MR. JOLLY: So the price of farmland kind
 - 6 of fluctuates with the price of commodities?
 - 7 MR. WYSS: Agreed.
 - **MR. JOLLY:** So, if the price of
 - 9 commodities were to escalate again, it's quite
 - 10 possibly and probable that they would escalate
 - 11 again?

- MR. WYSS: I hope so.
- 13 **MR. JOLLY:** Thank you.
- **14 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** One more question.
- 15 (QUESTIONS BY MS. BOTKIN.)
- **16 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** My name is Julie
- 17 Botkin, B-o-t-k-i-n. 23343 --
- **MR. DICK:** Spell your first name.
 - **MS. BOTKIN:** J-u-l-i-e. 23343 North 2600
- 20 East Road, Lexington, 61753.
- I just have one question for you. We
 - 2 farm. We live on 100 acres ourselves. I was
- 23 wondering, what areas -- you said land values are
- 24 fluctuating, going up and down. What areas are

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- 1 MR. WYSS: I would say they would be
- 2 closer than a mile.
- 3 **MR. JOLLY:** Half a mile?
- 4 MR. WYSS: Possibly closer.
- 5 **MR. JOLLY:** Okay. And these are
- 6 nonparticipants that you have talked to?
- 7 MR. WYSS: Yes.
- 8 **MR. JOLLY:** What was their reaction?
- 9 MR. WYSS: Their reaction was they would
- 10 prefer not to have them but they understand it's not
- 11 their decision.
- MR. JOLLY: Okay. You had talked about
- 13 farmland investing?
- MR. WYSS: Yes.
- MR. JOLLY: What are -- the last 15 years,
- 16 what has the trend in farmland been?
- MR. WYSS: It's been up.
- **MR. JOLLY:** Do you -- and I know this is
- 19 with your age -- about what year do you recall them
- 20 really escalating at?
- MR. WYSS: I remember when I was in fourth
- 22 grade my grandpa bought a farm for 3,000 an acre,
- 23 and then I kind of lost touch of things. I don't --
- 24 2006 and 2007 it really took off.

- 1 going down? Do you see a certain trend, like places
- 2 are going down whereas other places are not?
- 3 MR. WYSS: I would say prime farmland is
- 4 holding its value for such. Lesser quality land has
- 5 dropped off a lot. Farmland with a drainage ditch
- 6 through it, farmland with poor drainage,
- 7 triangular-shaped tracts, anything that is difficult
- 8 to farm or doesn't look as appealing to the eye is
- 9 dropping off, but prime farmland has pretty much
- Lo held its value.
- **MS. BOTKIN:** Okay. What do you consider
- **12** appealing to the eye?
- MR. WYSS: Nice square 80s, nice square
- **14** 160s.
- **MS. BOTKIN:** Okay. That's all I have.
- 16 Thanks.
- 17 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: Name and address and
- 18 spell your last name again.
- 19 (QUESTIONS BY MR. BOURGERIE.)
- MR. BOURGERIE: Dennis Bourgerie. B- as
- 21 in baseball, O-U-R-G, as in George, -e-r-i-e.
- My question is: Does the real estate tax
- 23 on farmland fluctuate up and down or does it
- 24 basically stay level and only go up?

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8

- 1 MR. WYSS: It's supposed to fluctuate.
- 2 The last five or six years it has gone up 10 percent
- 3 every year. Finally, it's still going up, but the
- 4 percentage increase is decreasing. So, in the last
- 5 year 8 or 9 percent increase, but I think we've
- 6 leveled off. We've caught up to the increased value
- 7 of land. I am hoping farmland real estate taxes
- 8 will, if not decrease, increase at a slower rate.
- 9 **MR. BOURGERIE:** That is the end of my 10 questions.
- 11 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Thank you.
- 12 (QUESTIONS BY MR. JOLLY.)
- **MR. JOLLY:** Tim Jolly, same address.
- You had mentioned about being prime
- 15 farmland?
- 16 MR. WYSS: (Nodding.)
- 17 MR. JOLLY: Would you probably classify
- 18 this farm ground as the best in the state?
- MR. WYSS: That's a little subjective, but
- 20 I would say McLean County is some of the best in the
- 21 state. Yes.
- MR. JOLLY: The yields in McLean County,
- 23 how do they rank statewide in corn and bean
- 24 production?

- 1 MR. JOLLY: Nine billion?
- 2 MR. WYSS: Nine billion, yeah. Excuse me.
- 3 MR. JOLLY: Do you know how many people
- 4 that an acre of farmland would feed?
- 5 **MR. WYSS:** I do not.
- 6 **MR. JOLLY:** Okay. That is all.
- 7 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Any other questions?
 - (QUESTIONS BY MR. JOHNSON.)
- 9 MR. JOHNSON: Bruce Johnson, Lexington,
- 10 Illinois, 15 Gregory Lane. J-o-h-n-s-o-n.
- You mentioned the taxes?
- MR. WYSS: Yes.
- MR. JOHNSON: Will the turbine on the farm
- 14 ground cause the taxes to go up?
- MR. WYSS: I believe any taxes associated
- 16 with the turbine itself are paid by Invenergy, but
- 17 if the assessment for the land goes up that would be
- 18 the responsibility of the landowner.
- MR. JOHNSON: So the answer to that
- 20 question is, yes, the taxes will go up, right?
- MR. WYSS: The assessed value on the
- 22 turbine structure itself is not taxed to the
- 23 landowner, to my understanding.
- MR. JOHNSON: Thank you.

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- 1 MR. WYSS: I am terrible with specific
- 2 numbers. I know they are always close to the top.
- 3 Woodford County was number one a year or two ago.
- 4 Piatt County is usually excellent. Macon,
- 5 Champaign.
- 6 **MR. JOLLY:** But McLean?
- 7 **MR. WYSS:** They are right there.
- 8 **MR. JOLLY:** They are right there?
- 9 MR. WYSS: Uh-huh.
- MR. JOLLY: When you are taking prime farm
- 11 ground out of production to put windmills on that,
- 12 do you think that is a prudent way to treat farm
- 13 ground?
- MR. WYSS: I don't think taking an acre of
- 15 land for a wind turbine is imprudent.
- MR. JOLLY: Do you think it would be
- 17 better served to put it in less productive ground?
- MR. WYSS: I understand your question. I
- 19 don't think it would matter where you put the wind
- 20 turbine.
- MR. JOLLY: Do you believe that the
- 22 population of the world is increasing or decreasing?
- MR. WYSS: I believe it's increasing.
- 24 Projected to be at 9 million in 2030.

- 1 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Any other questions?
- 2 You better push that button and run.
- 3 **MR. DICK:** Dave Kaufman?
- 4 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: Would you like to be
- 5 sworn in or affirmed?
- 6 **MR. KAUFMAN:** Sworn.
- 7 (DAVE KAUFMAN PLACED UNDER OATH.)
- 8 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: State your time and
- **9** address it and spell your last name.
- MR. KAUFMAN: Dave Kaufman, K-a-u-f-m-a-n,
- 11 549 County Road 500 East, El Paso, Illinois.
- First of all, I would like to thank the
- 13 board for the endless hours and evenings. I hope
- 14 you don't have jobs you got to get up at 5:00 in the
- 15 morning and you got to get up and go to work because
- 16 I know it's rough.
- But, anyway, my wife and I and my daughter
- 18 and granddaughter do own a farm just south of Chenoa
- 19 that we did sign up with Invenergy. And, like I
- 20 said, it's a family-owned farm with my wife,
- 21 daughter and granddaughter.
- One thing I'd like to point out that I
- 23 haven't really heard pointed out is the money.
- **24** Everybody is talking about the money that the

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- 1 windmill will bring in. Yes, I won't sit here and
- 2 say no they are not greedy with money. Yes, they
- 3 are.
- 4 But being a businessman, you got to
- 5 realize you can't hoard money or you pay income tax
- 6 on it. So this money, the thousands of dollars that
- 7 is coming in, McLean County will be spent -- the
- 8 majority of it will be spent in McLean County such
- **9** as buying machinery.
- Just our farm operation alone last year
- 11 bought over \$350,000 worth of machinery right out
- 12 here at Birkey's out here.
- And the revenue from the gentleman from
- 14 the -- that is putting it up, that made -- the
- 15 contractors, the people putting up the wind towers,
- 16 the income taxes they are going to be paying, and
- 17 they are going to have the income, and it's going to
- 18 be spent in McLean County. And that is about all I
- 19 got to say.
- 20 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Questions from the
- 21 board?
- (QUESTIONS BY THE BOARD:)
- MR. DEAN: So you are an active farmer
- 24 then?

- 1 MR. POWELL: Jeff Powell, P-o-w-e-l-l,
- 2 32897 East 2700 North, Chenoa, Illinois.
- I want to ask you the same question that I
- 4 asked earlier. Were you aware of the size of these
- 5 turbines when you signed with Invenergy?
- **MR. KAUFMAN:** I knew they were 2.5. Yes.
- 7 MR. POWELL: You said you farm. So, you
- 8 probably spent a lot of time on township roads?
- 9 MR. KAUFMAN: Yes.
- MR. POWELL: Would the size of those
- 11 turbines getting trucked in and all the construction
- 12 equipment and concrete trucks and whatnot, are you
- 13 concerned at all with that impact it will have on
- 14 those township roads?
- MR. KAUFMAN: No, because I watched -- I
- 16 work in North Normal. I watched the White Oak Farm
- 17 they put up on the northwest corner of Normal, and I
- 18 watched them, and I watched the roads.
- The main reason I watched the roads, Dave
- 20 Brown from the surveyor's, is my neighbor, and he
- 21 worked with the township commissioner as far as
- watching the roads and stuff like that, too; and I
- 23 never seen anything tore up out there.
- MR. POWELL: So, with the size of the

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- MR. KAUFMAN: Yes. I am an active farmer.
- 2 I have three farms over in El Paso, a farm, and one
- 3 over in Chenoa I rent to my nephew, and I help him
- 4 farm.
- 5 **MR. DEAN:** Okay.
- 6 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Will the farms that
- 7 are in this opposed district here, the wind farms,
- 8 stay in your family?
- 9 **MR. KAUFMAN:** Yes.
- 10 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: So your --
- 11 MR. KAUFMAN: No. No. They are already
- 12 in trust. You mean as far as renting them?
- 13 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Renting them.
- **MR. KAUFMAN:** Yes. My nephew rents them, 15 yes.
- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** That's all I have.
- **MR. ZIMMERMAN:** Does your nephew live on
- 18 the farm?
- 19 MR. KAUFMAN: No.
- 20 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Any questions from the
- 21 staff?
- Anyone in the audience have any questions
- 23 of this witness?
- (QUESTIONS BY MR. POWELL:)

- 1 White Oak Farm, you didn't see any issues; but these
- 2 are more than twice as big, maybe up to three times
- 3 as big. Do you think, you know, a bigger windmill,
- 4 bigger turbines, do you think that might have an
- 5 impact on the roads?
- 6 **MR. KAUFMAN:** Are you sure of the facts of
- 7 two and a half to three times bigger than the White
- 8 Oaks?

10

- 9 **MR. POWELL:** That is the information.
 - MR. KAUFMAN: Pardon me?
- MR. POWELL: The ones that the information
- 12 that you have been given is the White Oak windmills.
 - **MR. KAUFMAN:** If they are three times
- 14 bigger, they would have to be -- they would have to
- 15 be like a 2.75 megawatt, and these they are putting 16 up is 2.5.
- Can any of you gentlemen? I don't know.
- **MR. POWELL:** That is what I am trying
- 19 to --
- 20 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** We are just kind of 21 questions here. Someone will clarify later if we
- 22 have to.
- MR. POWELL: I mean I am in the dark about
- 24 it myself, so I am trying to find out exactly how

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- 1 big these will be myself.
- MR. KAUFMAN: We do farm right next to the
- 3 farm in Woodford County that has got a MED tower --
- 4 they call it MED tower -- on the farm that we've got
- 5 to farm. Right next to it, within I would guess
- 6 maybe -- don't get me to quote on this -- but I
- 7 would guess within 100 feet of the fence line there
- 8 is a turbine. I took my grandson out there with me
- 9 last fall to just to stand under it just to see
- 10 what, to show him what it looked like. And it was a
- 11 windy, fall day. Turbines were turning. I don't
- 12 know how many revolutions. And the farm that we was
- 13 on had four of them, four had turbines within an
- 14 eighth of a mile of the fence line, and not once
- 15 that afternoon did we hear the windmills, and I
- 16 don't know what size.
- MR. POWELL: In your experience in farming
- 18 all these years on township roads, have you
- 19 experienced whenever any road damage has occurred?
- 20 MR. KAUFMAN: From farm machines, or what
- 21 are you talking about?
- MR. POWELL: Just overweight equipment.
- MR. KAUFMAN: First of all, I am also in
- 24 the trucking business, and I don't believe the

- 1 MR. POWELL: Okay. Thank you.
- **2 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Thank you.
- 3 Any other questions?
- 4 MR. KAUFMAN: I can't get off that easy.
- 5 (QUESTIONS BY MR. JOHNSON:)
- 6 **MR. JOHNSON:** Bruce Johnson, 15 Gregory
- 7 Lane, Lexington, Illinois.
- 8 Do any of your family members live on
- 9 these farms with the wind turbines?
- 10 MR. KAUFMAN: No.
 - MR. JOHNSON: Thank you.
- 12 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: Thank you.
- MR. KAUFMAN: Can I say? I do live within
- 14 a mile of White Oak.

- **15 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Any other questions?
- I think I would run, if I was you.
- 17 MR. KAUFMAN: Thank you.
- **MR. DICK:** Dave Glacinski.
 - CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: Would you like to be
- 20 sworn in or affirmed?
- MR. GLACINSKI: Whatever.
 - **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** I'll swear you in.
- 23 (DAVE GLACINSKI PLACED UNDER OATH.)
- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** State your name and

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- 1 gentlemen are going to go out on the road with the
- 2 trucks that are over legal limit.
- Do you know what the legal limit is on a
- 4 truck?
- 5 **MR. POWELL:** Semi is 8.000.
- 6 **MR. KAUFMAN:** Per an axle. On a dual --
- 7 on an axle truck, do you know what the weight limit 8 is?
- 0 15:
- 9 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** We are getting into 10 testimony.
- MR. POWELL: Well, that is the thing. I
- 12 don't know what is coming in. I don't know how --
- MR. KAUFMAN: I am sure they would have to
- 14 be coming in legal. They are governed by -- they
- 15 are watched by the township road commissioner.
- MR. POWELL: Okay. The reason why I am
- 17 asking this question is because my concern is if
- 18 there is damage --
- **19 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Has to be a question.
- MR. POWELL: If you have seen road damage
- 21 before, has it been fixed properly in a manner, and
- 22 do you think that will happen after this project, if
- 23 there is road damage?
- MR. KAUFMAN: Yes, I do.

- 1 address and spell your last name.
- 2 MR. GLACINSKI: Dave Glacinski.
- My wife and I live at 132 Hilton Drive in
- 4 Lexington.
- 5 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: You are going to have
- 6 to spell your last name.
- 7 **MR. GLACINSKI:** Again? It's
- 8 G-l-a-c-i-n-s-k-i.
- **9** Like I said, my wife and I live in
- 10 Lexington, and there is a big need in Lexington
- 11 Township for a project like this to be successful.
- 12 The real estate prices, our taxes are too high, and
- 13 the school system, the cost of running the schooling
- 4 is not sustainable.
- I am going to point out four homes that I
- 16 know --
- 17 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Could you kind of
- 18 speak a little bit closer to the mic or pull it
 - **19** toward you?
- MR. GLACINSKI: Okay. I know personally
- 21 of four homes that have gone on the real estate
- 22 market over the last three years, or off and on
- 23 repeatedly. They could not sell, all right? The
- 24 owners told me it was due to the shaky school system

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- 1 and the high real estate taxes. Two of those homes
- 2 went into foreclosure. I was told a couple weeks
- 3 ago the third one went back to the bank. So,
- 4 obviously, the real estate value is not going to be
- 5 hurt by the windmills, all right?
- 6 However, after listening to the testimony
- 7 of Mr. Hartke and I think it was Dr. Schomer -- is
- 8 that right? -- it appears to be an issue with a
- 9 decibel rating in the proximity of the turbines. So
- 10 I think, unless that gets reasonably addressed, we
- 11 may be doing some harm to people living by. That is
- 12 all I have to say.
- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Questions from the
- 14 board?
- 15 (QUESTIONS BY THE BOARD.)
- MS. TURNER: How long have you lived in
- 17 Lexington?
- MR. GLACINSKI: 40 years. 41 years.
- MS. TURNER: Do you work in Lexington
- **20** also?
- MR. GLACINSKI: Oh, no. I am retired. I
- 22 come from a farming family, all right? I worked in
- 23 manufacturing myself.
- MS. TURNER: Okay. Thank you.

- CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: Could you spell your
- 2 first name, too, please?
- 3 MS. DUZAN: K-e-l-l-i-e.
- 4 Well, you all know my name. I am Kellie.
- 5 And you all know that I am a nurse. I have a
- 6 bachelor's of science degree in nursing from
- 7 Illinois Wesleyan, and for 11 years of my career I
- 8 was the school nurse in Lexington School District.
- 9 So, because of my nursing background, I have had an
- 10 interest in reading articles and studies that have
- 11 been done regarding the health effects of the12 turbines.
- One caught my eye especially. These
- 14 results are disturbing to me; I'll be honest. I
- 15 read of a conference on wind turbine syndrome, and I
- 16 am just going to read to you some bullet points,
- 17 some quotes from this, the professors and physicians
- 18 that spoke at that conference. It gives you a
- 19 little bit of information on how the ear actually
- 20 works.
- So, we are not going to get technical, but
- 22 your ear has three organs in it, one is used for
- 23 hearing, and two are used for motion sensing. So
- 24 that is a little bit of background.

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- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Questions from the **2** staff?
- 3 MR. DICK: No.
- 4 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: I guess I should ask
- 5 the applicant?
- 6 Any questions from the audience?
- 7 I think you are okay.
- 8 **MR. DICK:** Daryl Haney?
- 9 MR. HANEY: I am going to pass for now,
- 10 until February 6.
- MR. DICK: That will be a different
- 12 hearing you know?
- MR. HANEY: I understand.
- **MR. DICK:** Amy Laible?
- **VOICE FROM AUDIENCE:** She isn't here.
- **MR. DICK:** Kellie Duzan?
- 17 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Would you like to be
- 18 sworn in?
- 19 MS. DUZAN: Please.
- 20 (KELLIE DUZAN PLACED UNDER OATH.)
- 21 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: State your name and
- 22 address and spell your last name, please.
- MS. DUZAN: Kellie Duzan, D-u-z-a-n, 24322
- 24 North 2250 East Road, Lexington.

- So I am quoting these first few points
- 2 from Nina Pierpont, M.D., Ph.D., and a behavioral
- 3 pediatric specialist:
- 4 1.) The physiologic responses in the
- 5 hearing organ inside the ear suppress the hearing
- 6 response to low frequency sounds so we are not going
- 7 to hear that but still sends signals to the brain.
- 8 This physiologic response to turbine noise is a
- 9 trigger for tinnitus and the brain cell level
- o reorganization that that represents.
- So we know tinnitus is a ringing in the
- 12 ear. Most of us are kind of familiar with that
- 13 term.
- The New England Journal of Medicine
- 15 describes the pathophysiology as, quote, "What is
- 16 happening here is that the cells in the brain are
- 17 making new connections, not good connections. It's
- 18 like chaos in the brain, and it's like hearing a
- 19 noise that isn't really there. To take it a little
- 20 further, it is kind of like a phantom pain. If you
- 21 have known anybody who has had an amputation, there
- 22 is no lower leg there but they will still feel pain.
- 2.) The motion detecting organs in the
- 24 ear also respond to the airborne low-frequency

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- 1 sound. The physiological responses and signals from
- 2 these organs are known to generate a wide range of
- 3 brain responses, including dizziness and nausea,
- 4 fear and alerting, and difficulties with
- 5 visually-based problem solving.
- 5 3.) The increased alerting and the
- presence of wind turbine noise disturbs sleep even
- 8 when people do not recall being awaken.
- 9 Population level surveys show clear
- 10 disturbance of sleep and mental wellbeing out to
- 11 4600 feet from turbines with diminishing effects out 12 to 3 miles.
- These sensory systems in our ears change
- 14 our brain functioning. They affect not only what an
- animal or person feels and thinks at that very
- 16 moment but also how that brain will function in the
- 17 future, even the near future.
- Dr. Pierpont says that in her wind turbine
- 19 study she did a survey and a study from her private
- 20 practice. She started seeing so many symptoms that
- 21 were new after the project opened near her home.
- Seven out of ten school-aged children and
- 23 teens did worse in school during exposure to
- 24 turbines compared to before or after, including

- 1 adult subjects experienced a highly disturbing
- 2 collection of symptoms when exposed to high levels
- 3 of turbine noise. They felt movement inside their
- 4 chests, described a quivering, jitteriness or
- 5 pulsation, and then an uncomfortable urge to flee,
- 6 to get out of there. That is called the flight or
- 7 fight response. Or the feeling awoke them at night,
- 8 panic with racing heart, a feeling they could not
- 9 breathe or the sense that there had just been an
- 10 alarming noise like a window breaking, and then they
- 1 had to go check the house.
- Dr. Christopher Hanning, M.D., is a sleep
- 13 specialist: Wind turbines create a particularly
- 14 disturbing kind of noise with high alert potential.
- 15 This type of disturbance requires even less noise
- 16 than full awakening but still disrupts sleep and
- 17 restorative properties for mood, memories, thinking,
- 18 alertness, and coordination.
- From Rick James, a noise control engineer:
- 20 Disturbing high alert qualities of wind turbine
- 21 noise include high levels of low frequency noise and
- 22 infrasound as well as the pulsating quality of the
- 23 low frequency noise and infrasound. Both the
- 24 audible noise and the infrasound from turbines are

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- 1 unexpected problems in reading, math, concentration,
- 2 and test performance noticed by both teachers and
- 3 parents. Teachers sent home notes asking what was
- 4 wrong with the children.
- 5 And then she says over 90 percent of her
- 6 sample of affected people, both adults and children,
- 7 had cognitive difficulties during wind turbine
- 8 exposure, problems that lingered and resolved slowly
- 9 after exposure ended. These include difficulties
- 10 with reading, math, spelling, writing, multitasking
- 11 in kitchen and home, remembering a series of
- 12 errands, maintaining a train of thought in a
- 3 telephone conversation, following the plot of a TV
- 14 show, following recipes, and following directions to
- 15 put together furniture.
- Some of those seem a little trite, but we
- 17 in the nursing profession call those activities of
- 18 daily living, and we rate a person's health in the
- 19 home very highly. We regard those activities of
- 19 home very highly. We regard those activities of
- 20 daily living very highly. Obviously, we need those 21 to survive.
- Also, the balance system is closely linked
- 23 to emotions, especially fear, anxiety, and panic.
- 24 In her study, she says that 14 out of 21 of the

- 1 subject to "amplitude modulation," meaning the
- 2 loudness goes up and down, a quality that adds
- 3 markedly to its disturbing character.
- 4 A second point from the noise control
- 5 engineer is the arrangement and spacing of turbines
- 6 in clusters also affects how much noise they make.
- 7 A second turbine beating in the downwind turbulence
- 8 of the first turbine makes more noise.
- A final word from Dr. Pierpont at the end
- of her presentation, which was called wind turbine
- 11 syndrome and the brain speaks loud and clear, "For
- me it was both sobering and energizing to talk againwith victims of wind turbine syndrome at the
- 14 conference. At times distracted by political and
- 15 journalist noise, I forget how serious WTS actually
- 16 is. Separately a man and a woman from different
- 17 countries told me quietly of their thoughts of
- 18 committing suicide. Both are older with good
- 19 marriages and productive lives and adequate
- 20 resources. One has been driven from her home by
- 21 relentless nausea and vomiting, and the other is
- 22 made ill whenever he returns home. While
- 23 governments, the wind industry, and the media
- 24 continue to belittle and deny the experience of

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- 1 these individuals, I am reminded once more that the
- 2 physical, mental, social, and financial consequences
- 3 of this perfectly correctable condition are
- 4 appalling."
- 5 One other thing I would like to read
- 6 briefly -- you know what? I am not going to do
- 7 that. I've only got two minutes left.
- 8 It's a letter written, though, by the
- 9 Superintendent of the Armstrong Township High School
- 10 after the Cal Ridge project was completed, and it
- 11 describes some of the issues their school is having
- 12 with their students, with families leaving the
- 13 district.
- In one sentence he says, "The revenue
- 15 generated by the turbines is a blessing to our
- 16 schools, but the unintended consequences are real."
- So what does this mean for us personally
- 18 here in the footprint of this project? It means
- 19 that we must find a way to protect ourselves and
- 20 families. However, we are finding that those of us
- 21 with the most to lose have the least voice in the
- 22 matter. We are forced then to rely on each one of
- 23 you and the McLean County Board to protect our
- 24 rights. You have the opportunity to deny Invenergy

- 1 lot more. It's easy to find.
- **MS. CARLTON:** I'd like a copy of that.
- 3 MS. DUZAN: Sure. You can have that.
- 4 MS. CARLTON: Thank you.
- 5 **MS. DUZAN:** Uh-huh.
- 6 MS. TURNER: Kellie, have you had any
- 7 direct conversation with Dr. Pierpont who was at
- **8** that conference?
- 9 MS. DUZAN: No. No.
- MS. TURNER: Okay. Have you had any
- 11 direct -- any direct connection with anyone who has
- 12 had this windmill syndrome?
- MS. DUZAN: No. And this term windmill or
- 14 turbine syndrome is new. This is a new thing. This
- 15 is new territory.
- MS. TURNER: Are there other school
- 17 districts in -- are there other schools within your
- 18 school district that you were an RN in that had wind
- 19 turbines in their school's area?
- MS. DUZAN: No. Lexington is a K-12
- 21 district on our own.
- MS. TURNER: On your own?
- MS. DUZAN: Yeah.
- MS. TURNER: Do you ever get together with

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- 1 this project or at the very least demand setbacks
- 2 that will be safe for people rather than simply
- 3 meeting the minimum requirements.
- 4 Are each one of you willing to shoulder
- 5 the responsibility for undue difficulties placed on
- 6 the affected children and families of McLean County?
- 7 Do me a favor, take a good long look at
- 8 the room. I am serious. Just humor me. Look at
- 9 the people in this room. I don't see anybody
- 10 looking. Thanks.
- There are valuable lives at stake here.
- 12 Forcing each one of us to live among these dangerous
- 13 turbines against our will will force each one of you
- 14 to live with the weight of that decision. Thank
- **15** you.
- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Thank you. Questions from the board?
- 18 (QUESTIONS BY THE BOARD.)

- MS. CARLTON: Were you reading from a
- MS. DUZAN: Conference articles. I have
- 22 them here if you need them. There are several
- 23 stapled here. And those are just bullet points that
- 24 I pulled out that caught my attention. There are a

- 1 any nurses from other school districts?
- MS. DUZAN: Not anymore. I haven't worked
- 3 in the school since 2009.
- 4 MS. TURNER: Okay. All right. Windmills
- 5 haven't been around before that. I was just
- 6 wondering if any of them have ever said anything to7 you.

- long from spring through fall. He testified to the
- danger this turbine and the others in close
- proximity that he identified would pose to his
- pilots and the aircraft. 18
- In the 12 years since moving to our family 19
- 20 farm, we have already witnessed one crash on a clear
- 21 day with no manmade interferences, just natural
- 22 atmospheric conditions. The plane was destroyed,
- 23 but fortunately the pilot was not hurt and no homes
- 24 were impacted.

- 1 that Turbine Number 80 is uncomfortably close to an area that has not been studied and is on the edge of
- 3 a high-probability zone. There is a known density
- of archeological sites along the Mackinaw River he
- said in this area, several of which are recommended
- and eligible for inclusion in the Natural Registry
- of Historic Places. He spoke with an engineer at
- Burns and McDonnell, the company who will be doing
- the engineering studies for this project, and he was
- told no studies have yet been done.
- In light of all these extenuating
- circumstances, I am requesting that Turbine
- Number 80 be removed from the proposed plans.
- 2.) Neither my husband nor I are natives
- of McLean County. We both came to Bloomington in
- 1968 to attend college. Little did we expect that
- we would choose McLean County to be our home; but
- after we married and started our family, we soon
- realized that the quality of life that McLean County
- offered was just what we were looking for, and we decided to stay.
- In the early 2000s our former home 22
- 23 southeast of town was threatened by a request to
- 24 rezone the farmland adjoining our property from

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- 1 agricultural to a zoning which allowed for
- 2 absolutely anything to be built there. The county
- 3 board was forward thinking and in the end rejected
- 4 the rezoning. Through another means that beautiful
- 5 farmland was eventually declared a TIF district
- 6 which cleared the way for the construction of
- 7 storage units and a business. Despite expert
- 8 testimony to the contrary, property values were
- 9 dramatically impacted, and the business that was
- 10 built there has now sat abandoned for more than a
- 11 decade.
- I say this to illustrate the fact that a
- 13 lot of these proposals promise much but end up
- 14 delivering much less and leaving eyesores behind.
- 15 Unintended consequences.
- McLean County is a wonderful place to call
- 17 home. What I used to see is acres and acres of just
- 18 boring corn and soybeans I now appreciate as the
- 19 richest most productive farmland in the world. We
- 20 own two farms.
- But it's the people that make McLean
- 22 County what it is. We choose to live here. We
- 23 choose to raise our families here, to go to school
- 24 here, to work here, to shop here. We have choices,

- 1 best economic choice for many of us to remain here
- 2 when we can move to a state with little or no state
- 3 income tax, not to mention the better weather, but
- 4 we chose to stay because of the lifestyle and the
- 5 people.
- 6 All of the money in the world will not
- help a school district if there are not enough
- 8 children living in the district to keep it open.
- **9** Personally, we are not against wind energy
- .o in the wide open spaces of the heartland. It's when
- 11 it gets up close and personal that we have a
- 12 problem, a big problem. Many if not most of the
- 13 homeowner's most intimately affected by this project
- 14 stand to gain nothing but will be impacted the most.
- 15 The closest turbine to us is twice as far as away
- 16 from the person who has agreed to it than it is for
- 17 the five homes who will be impacted by it and gain
- 18 nothing.
- The 1500-foot proposed distance from homes
 - o is less than one third of a mile. Now, in town,
- 21 three tenths of a mile might seem like a long way.
- 22 In the country, three tenths of a mile is often in
- 23 our backyards. We can see an eagle soar or hear the
- 24 hoot of owls for over a mile away.

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- 1 but to many of us it's a quality of life decision.
- 2 According to a January 24, 2018, article
- 3 in the Chicago Tribune, 33,700 people chose to leave
- 4 the state of Illinois last year. That is the
- 5 greatest numeric loss of any state. This wasn't
- 6 just a one-year blip but the fourth year in a row,
- 7 and the decline continues to get bigger every year.
- 8 Illinois property taxes are the highest in the
- 9 nation according to US Census Bureau, as quoted in
- 10 the Chicago Tribune 4/27/2016, and the state income
- 11 tax is going up by 32 percent.
- Illinois home owners are fed up, and many consider moving, and as people leave they take their
- 14 pocketbooks with them.
- Bloomington-Normal used to be recession

proof. Not anymore. We all know people who are

- 17 moving or have already moved as a result of
- 18 businesses closing, like Mitsubishi, or relocating
- 19 with their employees, like State Farm, to more
- 13 with their employees, like State 1 arm, to me
- 20 business-friendly states.
- For some, McLean County will always be
- 22 home because of their work or their families. But
- 23 for many, remaining here is a choice. It has become
- 24 a quality of life choice. It certainly isn't the

- The people employed by Invenergy will go
- 2 back to their high-rise offices in Chicago when all
- 3 this is over and never have to look at let alone
- 4 live wit, the results of their proposal.
- And I am guessing most of you live in town
- 6 and only will be seeing these turbines from a
- 7 comfortable distance.
- 8 But for me it will be different. It will
- 9 be personal. When I walk out to get my mail and
- 10 look up, and I mean way up, I'll be looking at a
- 11 structure about the height of a 50-story building
- only about 800 to 1000 feet away.
- For me and many of my neighbors, it is a
- 14 quality of life issue, and we are looking to you to
- 15 stand in the gap and protect our homes. Imagine for
- 16 a minute if it was your mailbox or your home. Thank
- 17 you.18 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: Thank you. Questions

- 13 were at your mailbox it was about 800 to 1000 feet,
- 14 correct?
- 15 **MS. PITZER:** (Nodding.)
- MR. LUETKEHANS: You have to say yes.
- 17 MS. PITZER: Yes.
- **MR. LUETKEHANS:** Sorry. She can't take
- 19 down shakes, nods of the head, etc.
- MS. PITZER: Sorry.
- 21 MR. LUETKEHANS: Between your husband and
- 22 the mailbox is that farmland?
- MS. PITZER: It is not. No. It is our
- **24** yard.

- MR. ELDER: Sworn, please.
- (ERIC ELDER PLACED UNDER OATH.)
- 4 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: State your name and
- 5 address, and spell your last name.
- 6 **MR. ELDER:** Eric Elder, E-l-d-e-r. I live
- 7 at 25615 East 3000 North Road, Chenoa, Illinois, and
- 8 directly in the impacted area of this project.
- 9 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Could you spell your 10 first name?
- 11 MR. ELDER: E-r-i-c. And I apologize. I
- 12 have some laryngitis tonight.
- 13 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Don't worry about it.
- 14 Move a little closer.
- MR. ELDER: Thanks. Really, thanks for
- 16 asking for our comments and our thoughts. I really
- 17 appreciate it.
- Like many in this room, I live directly in
- 19 the impacted area, and this is very new information,
- 20 and quite surprising to most of us. Others, it
- 21 sounds like have signed contracts and have had
- 22 months and even tonight I heard two years to
- 23 consider this.
- Last night at the meeting was the first

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- 1 MR. LUETKEHANS: Thank you. One more
- 2 second. I am sorry. What do you use your yard for?
- 3 MS. PITZER: Oh, we have -- our family is
- 4 -- we now have 23 in our family. We have 11
- 5 grandchildren, five married children. We use it for
- 6 our family, and the land has been in our family for
- 7 -- since 1897, and we hope to pass it on to our
- 8 family in the future.
- 9 MR. LUETKEHANS: I am just talking about
- 10 the yard itself, not the farmland, okay?
- MS. PITZER: Our grandchildren play out there.
- MR. LUETKEHANS: That is what I want to know. Could you explain that?
- MS. PITZER: Yes. I babysit a lot and
- 16 have grandchildren over a lot. They play. They
- 17 ride their bikes. We play with our dogs out there.
- 18 We have a fire pit where we have a lot of friends
- 19 and family over and have cookouts.
- MR. LUETKEHANS: Thank you very much.
- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Any other questions?
- Push the button, if you would. Thank you.
- MR. DICK: Eric Elder?
- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Would you like to be

- 1 chance I had to talk to any of my neighbors about
- 2 this, with the holidays and being sick. This is the
- 3 first time I've had a chance in the last four weeks
- 4 since I got the letter. That is the first time I
- 5 ever heard of it.
- 6 Of my three neighbors that I talked to,
- 7 one was for, one was against, and one was neutral.

- 16 the room, is all of a sudden there is a decision
- 17 needing to be made, and it's very hard.
- I do want to say, though, to my friends
- 19 and neighbors in the room and the others in my
- 20 community: You know, I love them, I respect them,
- 21 and regardless of how this all goes I will continue
- 22 to love them and respect them. This isn't about
- 23 money. This is about neighbors and friends and
- 24 community, and that's just the way that we roll

1 here.

So I am not here in any way to deprive
anyone of an economic opportunity. I am just here
as a concerned citizen who has just gotten this
news. It was sort of like getting a letter from the
IRS and you open it and all of a sudden you find out
that something bad is happening around you that has
a negative impact and personally no direct positive
impacts to me.

In fact, it's actually more like getting a

letter or hearing from one of my daughters -- I've

got three daughters, and if one of them were to call

me up and, say, you know what, this guy has proposed

to me and we've set a date, and I know you've never

met him before but we are planning to get married by

the end of the year. What do you think, Dad.

the end of the year. What do you think, Dad.

We are talking about my very valuable
daughters, and I am going to just trust them to
someone that I've only just met and not even met
but, you know, I am just getting to know and they
want to make a decision that is going to impact them
for the rest of their life. And I am 54 years old.
This project will likely last for the rest of my
life.

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I read the proposal I believe from EDP
which is coming to Chenoa, and maybe that is what
you are hearing February 6; I am not sure. That is
a different one, but I just read their proposal on
the other side of Chenoa, and they offered a good
neighbor offer to people in the neighborhood who are
going to be negatively impacted. I don't know what
those amounts are, but I think that is very kind and
a neighborly kind of thing to do when you are going
to come and take something away from someone.

I am not expecting my neighbors to make
any other kind of decision that is not good for
them. I don't want to deprive them of making a good
sound decision. At the same time I don't want to be
deprived of my way of life, and I have lived in this
home for my life. I grew up here. My dad lived
there. My children live with me there. I moved
away after college. Happy to leave. Happy to go
live in big cities. And after years and years of
that, I am so, so happy to have moved back seven
years ago to this home where I grew up.

I believe there is a flaw in the Invenergy plan. I do believe this must be remedied before approval, and I think that would alleviate a lot of

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So it's all very new information. You guys have been down this road before. You've seen other wind projects around. But when it comes to your doorstep, when it's in your backyard, as I've heard from several people tonight, people don't mind wind farms. It's a great idea. I love it, just not in my backyard.

And I think there is real valid concern

And I think there is real valid concern
with that, and that addresses criteria number 1 of
your seven criteria. This does substantially affect
my health and comfort and welfare; and so, on that
basis, just from me personally, it fails on that
criteria.

Also, I believe it fails criteria Number 2

on your list, which is that it substantially impacts
the enjoyment. And even though it says it does not
substantially impact the property values, the fact
that they put that word in there, apparently it does
affect property values or they would say it will not
affect your property values.

My frustration with this is Invenergy has not come to me as a homeowner in this area and has not offered me any kind of compensation for the negatives they are going up in my backyard. 1 the concerns of people in this room. A lot of2 people are just frustrated by this. They are

3 annoyed by this. It's highly annoying -- and using

4 Dr. Schomer's words -- to many of us that have this

5 in our backyards, and I believe there should be some

6 kind of compensation offered. I am not saying I

7 would take it or not take it. I am not even

8 suggesting an amount, although an amount of \$6,000

9 per year for the life of the project would at least

nake me a little happier, it would at least make me

11 look at the wind turbines. I know I grew up on a

12 farm, and my dad had pigs. We had a pig farm, small

13 farm, pig farm. I've lived around pig farms. I

14 live around them now, and I've lived around all

15 kinds of grain bins, all kinds of projects. I

16 understand small farming.

But when you come in and have a whole industry here, that is when it takes a change of course. And the phrase at home was, whenever we smell pigs or drive by cows or any kind of thing that might be a little unpleasant, and what did we say? "Smells like money," and it puts a smile on your face. And I think this is putting a smile on a lot of people's faces, communities, schools,

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1 farmers, landowners. Unfortunately, it's not2 putting a smile on my face, and I think that is a

3 flaw in the plan when other energy companies offer

4 such a thing.

Living in the impacted zone myself, when I

6 read these criterions, the first two -- let me just

7 repeat those. I believe it does not meet it at

8 least for me personally. It might for others, and

9 for others are who being compensated and compensated

10 well. Obviously, they took the contracts because

11 they are being compensated well. They were able to

12 balance this out. I am not. It is detrimental to

13 my health, my comfort and my welfare and, in short,

14 my quality of life with no benefit to me to offset

15 that detriment.

The second: It will be injurious to my enjoyment of the other property in the immediate

18 area and will affect my property values.

And, of course, the definition of

20 substantial impact on your property values is very

21 debatable.

For me, I live in my home 24/7, nearly

23 365 days a year. I am an author and composer, I

24 write piano music, and I write books, and my home is

1 daytime sky, and the stars at night. I have also

2 chosen to live there because this is the home and

3 community where I grew up, where my mom and dad

4 lived and died, where my kids live me. I don't mean

5 to be overly emotional, but this is the home where I

6 held the hand of my wife as she passed from this

7 life to the next five years ago. I don't want to

8 look for another place to live. This is my home. I

9 love it. I love the people here. And if something

10 happens with these turbines where it significantly11 impacts my life and my way of life, that will be the

12 choice that I'll have to face just like others have

13 had to face.

Not to be mysterious, but I just want to protect this picture. I brought a picture with me of my farmstead. This was taken three years ago and

17 taken by an aerial photographer. I will be glad to

18 walk around and show it to you. This is my farm.

And one of my kids asked, Why did you buy that from the aerial photographer? You know, he's

21 just trying to scam you. He's just making a deal.

22 And I said, To me, this is so worth it. This is why

23 I moved back here. I look at this is my house that

24 I've lived in from childhood until now, and all this

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1 my getaway. My home is my respite. The reason I

2 love coming back to here is to enjoy the peace, the

3 quiet, the solitude. I take daily walks down my

4 property, summer and winter. I take my family down

5 the country roads. We take starry-night walks. I

6 done mean to get sentimental, but when you've lived

7 in the city for years and years and years, this is a

8 huge plus to my life at this stage of my life and

9 especially for my children.

This is not just a like for me personally,

11 but it also helps clear my mind, helps me to think

2 deeply and to write the books and the music that I

3 write, which are my livelihood, most creatively.

I've never lived by a wind turbine before.

I am concerned what I read about the visual flicker,

what that could cause on my sunset walks.

I am concerned about the audible noise
that that could cause whenever the wind turbines are

19 running day or night because I live there, as I say,

20 24/7.

I simply don't know how the turbines might

22 affect me. The potential is negative, though, with

23 no potential positive. I've chosen to live there 24 because of the peace and quiet, the views of the 1 property back here is free and clear and open.

And I told my daughter who asked me why I bought this, I said, because it is not always going

4 to be free and open and clear like this, and I want

5 to be able to remember it like this because I love

6 it like this and this is where I want to live.

7 I had little idea that three years later

8 everything you see here will be covered with

9 turbines. Everything you see here, this is the

10 direction where the turbine farm will be.

If it's okay if I approach you, I just

2 want to let you know this is real, this is my life,

13 and this is the life of many of us in this room,

14 farmers included. And I am not saying that I have

15 any other special right. I am saying I do have a

16 right to some kind of compensation to offset for the

18 If anyone else cares to see it closer,

19 I'll leave it up here on my desk.

loss of what this is.

I don't know that anything I am going to say is going to make a difference. You've already

22 approved two or three wind turbine farms here in the23 county.

You know, I just know that for me it hurts

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- 1 me. It's disappointing. And I would like more time
- 2 to get used to the idea, just like if I married off
- 3 my daughter. Maybe it's not a bad idea. I am not
- 4 opposed to wind energy. I wish I thought of it. I
- 5 wish I could have gathered the neighbors and said,
- 6 hey, guys, we've got this great natural resource. I
- 7 am a little bummed that a company from outside that
- 8 does not live here is coming down and able to do
- 9 this project. I mean I am glad for them. They are
- 10 able to do it and able to provide for their
- 11 families; I am not against that. I am just saying
- 12 I've not had time.
- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Hate to cut you off.
- 14 You're a little bit over.
- 15 **MR. ELDER:** Thanks.
- 16 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** We are a little bit
- **17** over.
- **MR. ELDER:** I am sorry. I didn't realize.
- 19 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** We understand.
- MR. ELDER: So my concluding would be just
- 21 that I believe it fails on the first two criteria
- 22 for me, and I believe there should be some
- 23 compensation in the proposal to offset people like
- 24 me. Thanks.

- 1 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Questions from the
- 2 staff?
- 3 MR. DICK: No.
- 4 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: Applicant?
- 5 **MR. GRIFFIN:** No thank you.
- 6 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Anyone in the audience
- 7 have questions?
- 8 **MR. ELDER:** Thanks.
- 9 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Thank you.
- 10 **MR. DICK:** Larry Ryan?
- 11 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: Would you like to be
- 12 sworn in?
- 13 MR. RYAN: Yes.
- 14 (LARRY RYAN PLACED UNDER OATH.)
- **15 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** State your name and
- 16 address. Spell your last name.
- **MR. RYAN:** Larry Ryan, R-y-a-n.
- **18 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** And your address?
 - MR. RYAN: 21544 North 1100 East Road,
- 20 Carlock, Illinois.

19

- 21 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: Okay. Go ahead.
- MR. RYAN: I understand that there was
- 23 comments recently for the lack of complaints from
- 24 the White Oak project, which I am, and have been

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- 1 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Questions?
- 2 (QUESTIONS BY THE BOARD:)
- 3 MS. TURNER: Eric, did you say how many
- 4 acres you are on there?
- 5 **MR. ELDER:** I live on two and a half
- 6 acres. My dad used to farm the 400 that are all
- 7 around me, so everything you see here was he farmed
- 8 this back 400 and across the road.
- And a good friend of mine and a neighbor
- 10 farms it now, and they are putting turbines up, and
- 11 I don't despise them at all. I am very thankful. I
- 12 am glad for their opportunity.
- **MS. TURNER:** Thank you.
- MR. ZIMMERMAN: How far away are you from
- 15 the turbines that are going up there?
- MR. ELDER: A neighbor just told me
- 17 tonight. I didn't know the actual distance.
- Do they know?
- 19 It's in my backyard. Yeah, in my
- 20 backyard, and it's not just that one but it's the
- 21 whole slew of them. I take advantage of the country
- 22 road. I ride bikes. This is my land. This is my
- 23 stomping grounds, so it's not just my backyard that
- 24 is affected. It's all of ours.

- 1 from the start to finish part of that project,
- 2 within it, and I would like to talk tonight about
- 3 the realities when you live in the middle of one of
- 4 these wind factories.
- 5 I currently live where I live. I have
- 6 four of them that are within 1500 feet, completely
- 7 in a 360 radius around my house, and I thought I
- 8 just wanted to tell you what it's like for the past
- 9 five years of living there and how things have
- o changed for my wife and I.
- I am retired, so now I spend most of my
- 12 time on the property. I have five acres. And I
- 13 thought, well, I would just talk a little bit about
- 4 what actually goes on through the project.
 - The first thing is the construction
- 16 process. I can tell you it's very disrupting for
- 17 anybody that lives within the project itself.
- 18 There's many times that your road will be blocked.
- 19 For some of us there is one way in and one way out,
- 20 and so you have to wait. It's not blocked all the 21 time, all day long. Sometimes it's four hours
- 22 because they are delivering the wind blades, the
- 23 towers, whatever. And I noticed that even some of
- 24 the farmers would have to wait until the roads were

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1 clear.

2 Most of the time, without notification,

3 you could be out grocery shopping and come back and

- 4 you've got groceries in your car and ice cream is
- 5 melting and whatever because you can't get into your
- 6 house.
- 7 Another thing is the noise. I've heard a
- 8 lot this evening about the noise and decibels and
- 9 all that. They are noisy, and I can tell you that
- 10 you hear a swish that sounds like a jet, whatever;
- 11 but the reality is that they are noisy. I can tell
- 12 you whichever way the wind is coming from. They are
- 13 less noisy when you are on the backside of the blade
- 14 as on the front side of the blade. Either way they
- 15 are noisy.
- I can tell you when you really know how
- 17 noisy they are is when they are not running. You go
- 18 outside and it is so quiet. You cannot believe the
- 19 difference. You can hear birds signing, whatever.
- 20 That is just the way it is.
- Another thing is the wildlife. Where I
- 22 live, I live close to Lake Evergreen, south of it,
- 23 and we've always had birds, deer going through our
- 24 property and so forth. We have no deer now. We

- 1 this -- and I watched the project through the entire
- 2 process. I wanted to explain to you what I got out
- 3 of this. Nothing. I got nothing out of it.
- That's all I have. I just wanted to pass
- 5 on what it's really like, and I do live in the
- 6 middle of all of these. Thank you.
- 7 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Thank you. Questions?
- 8 (QUESTIONS BY THE BOARD.)
- 9 MR. BANGERT: When this wind farm was
- announced, did you know about it right away, or how
- 1 did you first find out about it?
- MR. RYAN: Through our rural grapevine,
- 13 which the decision was already made, knew nothing
 - 4 about it.
- And, you know, where they measure the
- 16 wind, they have a tower they put up, and it was half
- 17 a mile from my property and I would drive by it
- 18 every day and wondered, the farmer must be measuring
- 19 something. I had no idea what was going on until we
- 20 learned after the fact.
- MR. BANGERT: And did you attend the
- 22 hearings during that project?
- MR. RYAN: Yes. Yes, I did. Yes.
- MR. BANGERT: Have you had to file any

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- 1 haven't had deer for quite some time. But birds,
- 2 less of the birds. And we always enjoyed that,
- 3 feeding the birds, especially in the winter, and
- 4 that doesn't happen either.
- 5 The last thing I wanted to talk about is
- 6 the landscape. I've heard a lot of people talking,
- 7 the gentleman before me, about the landscape. Where
- 8 I live you could, before the construction of these,
- 9 you could see forever and a beautiful sunset, but
- 10 everywhere I look now all I see is the towers.
- Also along with that is the flicker. The
- 12 flicker is not all the time. It happens mostly in
- 13 the a.m. and the p.m. for me. Other people, it
- 14 depends on the location, when the sun comes up. And
- 15 it happens all year round. Because of the location
- 16 of all these, fortunately, for me I always get the
- 17 flicker, but, again, at the most one hour in the
- 18 morning and about an hour in the afternoon. The
- 19 flicker cannot be reduced by shutting your blinds or
- 20 anything like that. Most of the time my wife and I
- 21 just decided it's about time we go to breakfast, so
- 22 we'll leave or we'll go to dinner somewhere just to
- 23 avoid the flicker, but it does occur.
- The last thing I want to say, after all of

- 1 complaints of any nature in order to establish --
- 2 you know, you noticed the noise, you noticed the
- 3 flicker. Have you had any independent companies
- 4 test these levels on your property?
- 5 **MR. RYAN:** No, I have not.
- 6 **MR. BANGERT:** Thank you.
- 7 MR. RYAN: Yes.
- 8 MR. ZIMMERMAN: You've talked about noise.
- **9** Do you feel anything?
- We've heard some testimony on infrasound
- 11 at the lower decibel range. Do you or your wife --
- 12 you can't really testify on her behalf, but do you
- 13 sense that there is any other vibration that you
- 14 feel?
- MR. RYAN: When we first -- when they
- 16 first fired those turbines up, we felt vibration in
- 17 the base of our house. And, again, it doesn't seem
- 18 to -- it doesn't seem to be there now. So could it
- 19 possibly be caused by those? I can't say, but it 20 was there in the beginning.
- I know that when you're standing out on
- 22 the road or you're between them, you got one on each
- 23 side of you and three are 1500 feet apart, sometimes
- 24 you will feel vibration. But, again, is that -- I

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- 1 don't know what it is. I would like to blame it on
- 2 that, but you know.
- 3 MR. ZIMMERMAN: Have you noticed any
- 4 cracks appearing in your house in the plaster,
- 5 foundation, or anything like that, that weren't
- 6 there before?
- 7 **MR. RYAN:** To answer that, I have not
- 8 noticed cracks in the foundation. But I will tell
- 9 you this: The contour must be much different after.
- 10 When they put the cable underground, they are
- 11 digging up everywhere. They have crossed waterways
- 12 and so forth. We've had all kinds of problems with
- 13 the waterways around our house. Since the start of
- 14 this project I have water in my basement, especially
- 15 in the spring when it rains, which I never had
- 16 before. I have a sump pump, but I also -- it's an
- 17 older farmhouse, and I have drains in the floor, and
- 18 the water comes up through the drains.
- **MR. ZIMMERMAN:** So how far away from your
- 20 house were these conduits or whatever was put
- 21 underground, just an estimate?
- MR. RYAN: It's just south of my property
- 23 I would say 500 feet.
- MR. ZIMMERMAN: Okay. Uphill? Downhill?

- 1 and that is what we want to hear.
- 2 So any other questions?
- 3 MR. KURITZ: Have you talked to the
- 4 company that runs that wind farm about your water
- 5 problems since then?
- I mean they were supposed to have fixed
- 7 all the field tile and everything that they crossed,
- 8 but, obviously, they could have missed one.
- 9 MR. RYAN: I do not live too far from
- 10 where the offices are and the substation. I will
- 11 tell you that it wasn't long after we had the water
- 12 problem and I went there to talk to them about, you
- 13 know, what is going on here and, to be honest with
- 14 you, I got the runaround.
- But the next time I went, it was a
- 16 different company. It wasn't Invenergy. They had
- 17 sold, and now I am talking to people, and they are
- 18 like you should have taken care of that before. I
- 19 never went back.
- 20 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Questions from staff?
- MR. DICK: No.
- 22 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: Applicant?
- MR. GRIFFIN: No thank you.
- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Come forward.

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- 1 **MR. RYAN:** I am -- from that, I am uphill.
- 2 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: How large is the
- 3 acreage you live on?
- 4 MR. RYAN: Five acres.
- 5 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Five acres. You
- 6 probably said that and I didn't hear it. Sorry. Do
- 7 you notice the noise in your house?
- 8 MR. RYAN: Yes.
- 9 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Every day?
- MR. RYAN: I'll give you an example. You
- 11 know, a lot of people go to sleep with a fan
- 12 running, okay? And my grandkids love a fan every
- 13 night. But in the summertime, you know, when it's
- 14 not real hot outside, you have your windows open.
- 15 You do not need to run the fan because you can hear
- 16 those, and it's not as strong as a fan right next to
- 17 your bed, but you can still hear those at night.
- **18 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Does it bother you
- 19 getting to sleep or do you get used to it?
- MR. RYAN: At first it was annoying, very
- 21 annoying. Five years, you get used to it. I mean
- 22 what else can we do?
- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** You are being honest.
- 24 That is what we want. You seem like an honest guy,

- 1 (QUESTIONS BY MR. POWELL:)
- 2 MR. POWELL: Jeff Powell, P-o-w-e-l-l,
- 3 32897 East 2700 North, Chenoa, Illinois.
- 4 You mentioned how you haven't seen any
- 5 deer and the birds that you enjoyed don't come
- 6 around anymore. I like to go outside at night and
- 7 look at the stars. That is one of the reasons why I
- 8 moved to the country. What is it like at night?
- 9 MR. RYAN: You mean what is it like to be
- 11 MR. POWELL: (Nodding.)

outside at night?

- **MR. RYAN:** It's noisy; I know that.
- MR. POWELL: But can you still look at the
- .4 stars? Is there a red glow from the lights flashing
- 15 upon you? That is what I am curious about.
- **MR. RYAN:** In our project, not all of the
- 17 towers have the red light flashing, okay? Now, I believe three of the four do not have the light
- 19 flashing. So, yet, you can be outside. You can
- 20 look straight up, see the stars and all that. You
- 21 don't want to look, north, south, east, or west; you
- 22 need to look straight up.
- But I can tell you that from one of our
- 24 picture windows, if we are sitting in there watching

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- 1 TV, sure enough the one straight out there, the
- 2 light does work and it goes off and on. You know,
- 3 based on the experience prior to approaching the
- 4 company about the issues, we just pulled the blinds.
- 5 That is what we did.
- 6 MR. POWELL: Okay. I, too, live near a
- 7 waterway and have concerns about water coming in my
- 8 basement. Did you have to add a sump pump? You
- 9 said you have one.
- MR. RYAN: We have one sump pump. I did
- 11 not do anything. We just -- I bought a pump. I run
- 12 the hose down and, when the water comes up, I just pump it outside through one of the basement windows.
- MR. POWELL: So now you have to keep
- 15 everything up off of the floor?
- 16 MR. RYAN: It is.
- **MR. POWELL:** Okay. I think that is all I
- 18 have. Thank you for coming and sharing.
- 19 MR. RYAN: Thank you.
- 20 (QUESTIONS BY MR. DUZAN:)
- MR. DUZAN: Dave Duzan, 2423 North 2250
- 22 East Road, Lexington. D-a-v-e D-u-z-a-n.
- Mr. Ryan, you spoke to the fact of during
- 24 construction of the wind turbine project that there

- 1 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Would you like to be 2 sworn in?
- 3 **MS. BACHMAN:** Yes, please.
- 4 (LINDSAY BACHMAN PLACED UNDER OATH.)
- 5 **MS. BACHMAN:** My name is a Lindsay
- 6 Bachman, L-i-n-d-s-a-y, last name B-a-c-h-m-a-n. I
- 7 live at 23479 East 2700 North Road, Lexington.
- 8 I am a lifelong resident of McLean County,
- 9 specifically Lexington. My parents are also
- 10 lifelong residents as well as their parents. This
- 11 makes me the third generation to call McLean County12 home.
- My husband was raised in Woodford County
- .4 but has been here the last seven years. We recently
- 15 chose to make this our permanent home and to raise a
- 16 fourth generation of McLean County residents.
- 17 Unfortunately, for the first time in my life I am
- 18 being forced to wonder if we made the right
- 19 decision.
- For the eight years that I have known my
- 21 husband we wanted nothing more than to raise our
- 22 family in the country. We both had the privilege of
- 23 growing up on family farms, my family raising
- 24 cattle, and his family growing corn and soybeans.

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- 1 was frequent road interruptions?
- 2 MR. RYAN: Uh-huh.
- 3 MR. DUZAN: In your opinion, if you would
- 4 have had a heart attack or a fire, how easy would it
- 5 have been for emergency vehicles to get to your
- 6 location?
- 7 **MR. RYAN:** I don't know. But how could
- 8 they get through?
- 9 MR. DUZAN: So you might be cold before
- 10 they get there?
- 11 MR. RYAN: It could happen.
- MR. DUZAN: Yeah.
- MR. RYAN: We were worried and we even
- 14 went to the EMS -- well, Carlock Fire Department,
- 15 and I believe that there was some discussion already
- 16 about in case this were to happen. But it still
- 17 makes you wonder when the road is blocked.
- **MR. DUZAN:** Yeah. That's all I have.
- **19 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Any other questions?
- I think you are off the hook. Thank you
- 21 for coming.
- MR. DICK: Tim Killian?
- MR. KILLIAN: I pass.
- MR. DICK: Lindsay Bachman?

- 1 I firmly believe that there is no better
- 2 way to spend a childhood, and we wanted that life
- 3 for our own family. Went spent five years working
- 4 hard, saving money, and praying for the opportunity.
- 5 Finally, last spring that opportunity came. On
- 6 March 8, 2017, our offer was accepted on a small
- 7 farm north of Lexington. On April 21, 2017, we
- 8 closed and it officially became ours. I am not
- 9 exaggerating when I say that the three happiest days
- 10 of my life have been the day I married my husband,
- 11 the day our daughter was born, and the day we bought
- 12 our farm; although, I will say the order could
- 13 depend on the day. The last nine months of living
- 14 on our new property have been some of the very
- 15 happiest in my 30 years.
- My daughter, who celebrated her second
- birthday in our new home, I actually grabbed herpicture off the wall as I was walking out the door.
- 19 I'll just put that here. She loves nothing more
- 20 than to be outside. I stay home with her. We are
- 21 home almost all day every day. The weather has to
- 22 be pretty bad for us to not spend as much time
- 23 outside as possible. In the summer, this meant 8:00
- 24 in the morning until 8:00 or even later at night.

My entire adult life all I've ever wanted 2 was a front porch that faces west to enjoy our 3 beautiful Central Illinois sunsets and unobstructed 4 views. We have that at our new home, and it is 5 truly my most favorite place in all the world to be.

In fact, this past summer my husband knew 7 that if he wanted to do something that meant a lot 8 to me, it would be to put our daughter to bed so I could spend my evening on the porch with a good

book. 10

11 Now, after only nine months of getting 12 settled and enjoying our new home, it's all being 13 threatened. We were given no notice of a possible wind farm from the couple that sold us their property. Whether or not they had a legal 16 obligation to disclose this information, I do not know. But being a longtime family friend and a

family that we see at church every Sunday, one would think they would have felt a personal obligation. We are set to have five turbines within 20 21 4600 feet of our house. I actually -- before Kellie

22 testified, I had no idea that she was going to be 23 bringing up that exact number and some of the

24 medical research that she did.

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1 expert. However, has a homeowner with an obligation 2 to protect and speak up for my family, that does not 3 make it any less applicable to me.

I would also venture to say that, if any 5 of your homes were being presented as being 6 threatened in such a way as mine was, your feelings towards Mr. Slagel's testimony may be different as well.

9 I have with me a copy of Mr. Hankard's sound portion of Invenergy's application to the 11 county. On page 13 of that study -- excuse me -- on page 13 of that study is a table of highest predicting noise levels at nonparticipating residents.

15 My family residence falls in the number 2 16 spot on that table. I will admit all of these sound figures are a bit hard for me to make sense of, but I do know that the potential noise levels at our home are extremely close to those that Ted Hartke testified to on Tuesday night.

21 I am begging you, each one of you to not 22 do that to my family. At the very least, if you vote to allow this project, I ask that you would 24 please consider safer setbacks of these turbines to

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The closest of those being only 1,710 feet 2 away from our foundation. Ironically, three of 3 those five turbines are on family ground associated 4 with the couple that we purchased our home from. 5 They moved to town, and not only will they reap the 6 financial benefits of these turbines without the 7 negative side effects but they may have knowingly put my family in a compromising situation.

I can sit here and tell you with 100 percent certainty that had we known what might 11 happen less than a year later and the effects of which it could have on us, we more than likely would not have purchased our home.

You were all here on Tuesday night when I 15 noticed my own home on Mr. Slagel's slideshow. You saw it. Our property was up there. I would say we were more than three quarters covered in red. The only small portion that was in the yellow was the northwest corner of our property. None of our 20 buildings are there. We spend none of our time 21 there.

1 our homes.

3 testimony I wanted to bring before you tonight. Our 4 family was hit by illness this week, and I have spent that time tending to my child. It is more emotionally charged than I had intended because that 7 is what became easier and, frankly, quicker for me to compose; but at this point that might not matter. You've heard the facts already. You didn't need me to reiterate them. Whether or not you choose to take them as seriously as those of us threatened with this situation are, that is not my choice to

Unfortunately, this is not the fact-based

At this point you need to know that there 15 are very real people facing very real consequences 16 of your actions, actions that we have very little to no control over but will experience the greatest amount of turmoil from.

I debated being here tonight. My daughter 19 is at home sick, and I originally felt that my obligation was to be at home with her. But the more 22 I spent my day thinking about it, I came to one 23 conclusion: My daughter will never remember that I 24 wasn't home to be with her tonight, but I can make

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- 1 sure that she is able to someday remember that her
- 2 mom did everything in her power to keep her safe, to
- 3 keep her comfortable, and to keep her happy, and
- 4 that means being in front of you tonight.
- 5 I've already lost plenty of sleep over the
- 6 thought of our future in regard to this wind
- 7 project. I am going to ask you one more time to
- 8 please not be the reason I lose more.
- **9** At the end of the day I am only
- 10 responsible for advocating for three people, myself,
- 11 my husband, and my daughter. Regardless of the
- 12 outcome of your decision, I will be able to know
- 13 that I did everything I could to stop it and to
- stand up for us, but you as a board are responsible
- 15 for the health and safety of many more people than
- 16 that, very real people living very real lives whose
- 17 quality of life is very much at stake.
- 18 If you vote to move forward with this wind
- 19 project and our lives are as affected as much as I
- believe they will be, I sincerely hope that you
- 21 possess enough of a conscious to lose a little sleep
- 22 right alongside us. That's all I have to say.
- 23 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: Thank you.

- So, with that, I'll get into the letter I
- 21 whipped up before I came. As a nonparticipating
- 22 resident within the proposed area of the Invenergy
- 23 project, my wife and I have many concerns about what
- 24 life may be like if the project goes through. My

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- 1 (QUESTIONS BY THE BOARD:)
- 2 MS. TURNER: Do you know the numbers of
- 3 the wind turbines, Kellie -- or Lindsay?
- 4 MS. BACHMAN: That's all right. I have
- 5 been called Kellie before.
- 6 I do. Let me find that paper. I don't
- 7 have the distances with me tonight.
- 8 MS. TURNER: That's okay. All I need are
- **9** the numbers.
- MS. BACHMAN: 32 is the closest one that I
- 11 referenced, 31, 33, 105, and I believe 29 are the
- 12 five that I mentioned are within 4600 feet.
- So, if I were to say, 32 is possibly our
- 14 biggest concern and the one that if I were to ask
- 15 you to specifically take action on one would be to
- 16 at least move that one further from our home.
- **MS. TURNER:** And I am sorry. I got 32,
- 18 31, 33, 105, and then what was the last one? 29?
- **MS. BACHMAN:** I believe 29.
- MS. TURNER: Okay. Thank you.
- 21 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Does the staff have
- 22 questions?
- 23 Applicant?
- MR. GRIFFIN: No thank you.

- 1 wife and I both grew up in the country, and I have
- 2 been connected to agricultural since the day I could
- з walk.
- 4 Over the past several years we have lived
- 5 within the city limits of a few towns in McLean
- 6 County because we wanted to see what city living --
- 7 if it would be better for our kids since we did not
- 8 know what that was when we were growing up. It did
- 9 not take very long for us to realize that we wanted
- 10 to get back to the country in the worst way because
- of the peace and quiet and freedom that it gives.
- 12 Needless to say, this wish was easier said
- .3 than done since a nice house in the country with
- 14 land in McLean County is typically not cheap.
- 15 Luckily for us, we found a home on a few acres east
- 16 of Lexington that is exactly what we were looking
- 17 for, and we moved in on October 6, 2017. We felt
- 18 like we hit the jackpot. We love the house. We
- 19 love the land that we have, the open views of the
- 20 sunrise and sunset, and the peace and quiet.
- We are fully aware of some of the
- 22 inconveniences that can come from rural living such
- 23 as the smells, dust, farm machinery, noise, etc.,
- 24 but we are completely fine with those things because

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1 we have been around them most of our lives.

2 Unfortunately, our joy was quickly

3 squashed when went found out about the proposed

4 Invenergy plan. Their plan has a turbine placed

5 about 1500 feet upwind from our house. It shocked

6 me to find out that the setback for these turbines

7 was only 1500 feet even though they are much larger

8 than any other in McLean County and have more than

9 double the sweep area of those that are existing.

I do not know yet if the blade noise,

11 shadow effect or motor noise will have any adverse

12 effects on my family or not, but I do know that I do

13 not want to have to just wait and see.

I have a hard time believing that the best

15 interest of the residents within the footprint of

16 this project have been considered.

Has there been a survey sent out to all

18 the residents involved to find out if anybody has

19 sensory issues such as kids with autism or

Asperger's or any condition that these effects would

21 have a greater impact on? I know that I have not

22 received anything of that sort.

Is a 1500-foot setback with much larger

24 turbines guaranteed to not create issues with

1 house is at least that, and a turbine would be much

2 more involved. There are other wind companies that

3 have had much more set aside.

4 For the acreage that does get used with

5 the wind farm, will it change to be zoned commercial

6 rather than agricultural?

When the 1-acre turbine and 15-acre

8 substation gets taken out of agricultural

9 production, they should then be zoned as commercial

10 property. That is no different than if I let a

11 convenience store or any other company build on one

12 acre of my land. The McLean County Board would have

13 that acre of land changed to commercially zoned

14 within a heartbeat.

We hear that the wonderful benefit of

16 having this wind farm is that it will bring all

17 kinds of tax money to the local schools and the

18 county. I would like to know that, if this is the

19 case, and with McLean County already having several

20 wind farms, has anyone's taxes ever gone down? Are

21 schools really that much better off? I know that my

22 taxes have increased every year in the ten years we

23 have lived in McLean County. So, in my mind, the

24 only financial benefit for those projects is to give

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1 neighbors, especially those with sensory issues?

2 My concerns are not just limited to the

3 potential health issues, but I also have concerns

4 with the longevity of wind farms. It should be no

5 secret to anyone that wind companies are highly

6 subsidized by the government. Not a single wind

7 energy company would not be in business if they did

not get their pockets lined by the government.

My question is: What happens to the

10 established wind farms and when or hopefully the

11 federal government decides to cut all funding to

12 wind energy?

I know Invenergy is suppose to be setting

14 aside something like -- I think the number I heard

15 was \$50,000 per turbine for removal if that happens,

but that money will not even exist in an account for

17 several years.

What if funding gets pulled before that

19 timeframe or what if the company goes bankrupt and

20 there is no company that wants to buy them?

I also have a hard time believing that

22 full removal of a turbine, concrete, rebar, etc.,

23 would only cost \$50,000 because if you probably look

24 at your homeowner's insurance, removal for your

1 our county and local governments more money to

2 waste. The supposed influx of tax dollars never

3 really goes to benefit the citizens of the county.

I am also curious to know if Invenergy is

5 going to offer all 450 nonparticipating property

6 owners a neighbor agreement and property value

7 guarantee agreement like they did to the residents

8 of Livingston County to the tune of 15 to \$20,000.

9 I do not care about the money nor necessarily know

10 that I would even take it if they offered it, but I

11 am curious to see if they are willing to treat

12 McLean County residents like they were prepared to

13 treat Livingston County residents.

I would also like to know if they are

15 going to give all of the nonparticipating residents

a 24-hour hotline phone number to call in order to

17 have turbines shut down at night if residents cannot

18 sleep.

If they do not, are the members of the ZBAand McLean County Board that may potentially vote in

21 favor of this project willing to give us your phone

22 number so that we can call you instead?

24 how happy my wife and I and kids were about finally

Going back to my comments earlier about

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- 1 being in the country and having land with a
- 2 beautiful view as God intended, my heart broke the
- 3 other night this week when I got home to find that
- 4 my wife was already looking at houses online in
- 5 order to get out while we still could.
- We have already poured out a lot of blood,
- 7 sweat and tears in our new home that we love so much
- 8 in the four short months that we have been there,
- 9 and now we face the possibility of our dreams being
- shattered by a company that is only concerned about
- 11 money and a select handful of people that will vote
- 12 on the project.

16

- I am obviously opposed to this project
- 14 going through because I do not feel that the limited
- 15 benefits will outweigh the downfalls of the project.
 - I hope that everyone here seriously takes
- 17 to heart all sides of the equation and that you
- 18 would ask yourselves if you would be willing to have
- your house surrounded by wind turbines only
- **20** 1500 feet away.
- 21 Please remember that the duty of
- 22 government and all levels of it is to uphold the
- 23 state and federal constitution and protect the
- 24 rights of its citizens which are whom all government

- 1 **MR. DICK:** Tim Jolly.
- **2 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Do you want to be
- 3 sworn in or affirmed?
- 4 MR. JOLLY: Sworn in, please.
- 5 (TIM JOLLY PLACED UNDER OATH.)
- 6 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: State your name and
- 7 address and spell your last name.
- **MR. JOLLY:** Tim Jolly, J-o-1-1-y, 26759
- 9 East 2700 North Road, Chenoa.
- First, I would like to start out that
- 11 there is no way that I can speak as eloquently and
- 12 completely as what Eric Elder and this last
- 13 gentleman did, but you could ditto everything they
- 14 say to my circumstance.
- 15 I've testified before. I've started
- 16 testifying in these hearings since October of 2016
- 17 when they first started and undertook to try to set
- 18 the zoning ordinances for what this wind farm is
- 19 about to do to this county.
- 20 At that time I addressed the
- 21 decommissioning. There was an agricultural impact
- 22 mitigation agreement, and what I was dealing with or
- 23 what I was asking about was the decommissioning of
- 24 the concrete that was in the ground, what it would

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- 1 employees report to and it is not the duty of any
- 2 government body to help pad the pockets and greed of
- 3 corporations. Thank you.
- 4 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Thank you.
- 5 Questions from the board?
- 6 (QUESTIONS BY THE BOARD:)
- 7 MR. ZIMMERMAN: Do you know which turbine
- 8 is marked the 1500?
- 9 MR. HUDSON: I can't recall the number on
- 10 it offhand. I would have to look at it on the map.
- 11 MR. ZIMMERMAN: You mentioned autism and
- 12 other concerns. Do any of your children have these
- 13 sorts of afflictions?
- MR. HUDSON: Fortunately, mine do not; but
- 15 I am aware of a few within Lexington that do.
- **16 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Questions from staff?
- 17 **MR. DICK:** No.
- **18 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Applicant?
- **MR. GRIFFIN:** No thank you.
- 20 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Anyone in the audience
- 21 have questions?
- We are wearing them down. I think you are
- 23 okay.24 MR. HUDSON: Thank you.

- 1 take to get rid of this mess above the ground, and
- 2 the mitigation agreement suggested that they grind3 the concrete down to a 5-foot level below the
- 4 ground. Invenergy didn't think that they should
- 5 have to go that far because that was too costly.
- 6 So, what they were suggesting was 48 inches. So
- 7 that was the first time that I noticed that they
- 8 seemed to think they were calling the shots in this
- operation.

After that, that evening there was several

- 11 people on hand. They all signed up just like these
- 12 meetings have been done, and about the second or
- 13 third on the list there was somebody that had signed
- 14 up to testify to the sound or the noise or something
- 15 to that effect, and I believe that they even had
- 16 contacted Dr. Schomer to come and testify at that 17 time.
- When they got to his name they saw that he
- 19 had boxes, as you see here, people with testimony
- 20 that is pertinent to this situation. So they asked
- 21 him and told him that everybody was going to have a
- 22 chance to speak, if he could sit and wait until the 23 end and have his presentation heard. It was ten
- 24 minutes until 10 -- not even that. I think it was

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- 1 like 9:57, and he began his presentation. He
- 2 couldn't even get into what had to do with the
- 3 sound. He couldn't even get into the particulars of
- 4 his presentation, and he was cut off. The hearing
- 5 that night was not continued. There was not another
- 6 one scheduled to hear the facts on that, that I know 7 of.
- 8 But just like everybody I've heard, this
- 9 thing has been rushed through, shoved through and
- 10 not told to anyone. None of the Chenoa or Lexington
- 11 papers have had notice of these hearings for the
- 12 people that it affects. So, to that fact, that in
- 13 itself, it ought to be denied completely.
- Then you have the towns of Chenoa and
- 15 Lexington put in a very bad circumstance. Invenergy
- approaches them, tells them, if you put turbines
- 17 within the mile and a half surface around your town,
- 18 we'll give you money. That's a bribe.
- They put -- they wanted to put 18 turbines
- 20 inside the mile and a half around Lexington.
- 21 Ridiculous. That town is growing, thriving, the
- 22 only small town in this area that has a school K
- 23 through 12.
- I am from Chenoa. I know what it's like

- that I see that Invenergy is trying to control thisshow.
- 3 So then we get into this hearing. I
- 4 missed the first one. I wasn't even sure when it
- 5 was. I had a friend told me. They were at
- 6 Heartland College, which is great. It is a great
- 7 setting. We had good presentations. Invenergy
- 8 spent four days presenting their evidence. They had
- 9 evidence that was pretty interesting, but it was all
- 10 paid for by Invenergy.
- So you have sound system or the sound
- 12 testimony where you are adding decibels, subtracting
- 13 decibels. They had so many figures and things
- 14 thrown out there how can anybody understand? The
- 15 thing is, is everything I saw they were at the state
- le limits; they were right there.
- There is also those state limits are to
- 18 the foundation of the house. Just as you've heard
- 19 tonight, we don't stay in our house. I heard
- 20 testimony the other night that it's at nighttime is
- 21 when you check it. People work at night. People
- 22 live outside at night. I go out and see stars at
- 23 night. So why aren't those taken into account?
- It's a 24/7, our homestead. We live in a

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- 1 to have a school dissolved, not something that is
- 2 agreed to but dissolved by a school board that I sat
- 3 on that I opposed four to three. We had a board
- 4 election to get rid of those three, but we couldn't
- 5 get the fourth vote.
- 6 So Lexington decides to barter with
- 7 Invenergy. Whether they raise the price, I don't
- 8 know; but somehow they decided to accept nine
- 9 turbines on the west and north side because they
- 10 wanted to advance their expansion on the east side.
- 11 So, they wanted to agree to them. I think they are
- 12 getting like \$1,500 a turbine to agree to that
- 13 agreement.
- So then, before that even, they went up to
- 15 Chenoa, and they have four turbines in their mile
- 16 and a half area.
- I've talked to the mayor in both towns.
- 18 The people in the towns don't even know what hit
- 19 them. The mayor in Chenoa, after visiting with him,
- 20 I believe he abstained his vote, but the councilmen
- 21 voted it through, clearly.
- So now you've got nine in Lexington, four
- 23 in Chenoa that are within the limits that you set
- 24 for them to keep out of. So that's the second point

- 1 house that is rented. It's probably got
- 2 approximately five acres. We use the entire area.
- 3 We are renovating, and I testified to this at that
- 4 October of '16. We are renovating a house that has
- 5 been in my family since 1864. I am fifth-generation
- 6 farmer, proud to be so. We bought the house and 80
- 7 acres. The building, there again, is about another
- 8 5 or 6 acres. Use every bit of it.
- They don't measure to the edge of the
- 10 property that we use. They measure to that
- 11 foundation of a house. I am not staying inside my
- 12 house.
- We are spending a lot of money to renovate
- this house, and now all of a sudden this comes up.
- Now, this last week I find out that, once
- 16 this is over, February 6 they are going to undertake
- an EDP application that is right where that house
- 18 is. Now we get to do it again. How many times is
- 19 it going to go? Where does it stop?
- These people come in. They do their dog
- 21 and pony shows. They get on their greed train, and
- 22 they leave town. This is our lives. We live here.
- 23 My family has been here. I am emotionally tied, and
- 24 I can't speak as well as they do.

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- Questioning on the farmland aspect, each
- 2 turbine takes up an acre of ground. Each acre feeds
- 3 two to four people. 100 turbine projects could
- 4 possibly take food away from 2 to 400 people. You
- 5 heard tonight the population is going to get to 9
- 6 billion. It ain't going to stop there. They don't
- 7 make farmland no more. When it comes down to it,
- 8 what do you want to do? Eat food or have
- 9 electricity? That is where your decision needs to
- 10 lie as far as farm ground goes.
- But as far as the people's houses and
- 12 that, it's got to come down to what is important to
- 13 you, staying in town where there is no turbines or
- 14 do you want to live out where the turbines are and
- 15 take your chances at what the repercussions are.
- 16 And I want to live there with no repercussions.
- 17 There hasn't been any before. We were fine before
- 18 they got here. We will be fine when they leave
- 19 without this project. Thank you. I'll stay here.
- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** You did a good job.
- MR. JOLLY: Thank you.
- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Questions from the
- 23 board?
- 24 (QUESTIONS BY THE BOARD:)

- 1 1917. And we have 160 acres there that my four
- 2 brothers or three brothers and I are in my mom's
- 3 trust. My wife and I actually bought 60 acres off
- 4 Myanfers (phonetic), and then now my brothers and I,
- 5 the four of us, we split the 100 acres in a trust.
- 6 So they are involved, too.
 - **MR. BANGERT:** There is a reoccurring theme
- 8 that we've heard through the course of these
- 9 meetings, which is we just found out, we just heard
- 10 about this. And I guess I should be asking this
- 11 more often: What form of notifications are
- 12 reaching, say, you?
- MR. JOLLY: Okay. Well, we have to
- 14 actually go back to the 2016 meeting, okay? And
- 15 that was just by word of mouth that, hey, they are
- 16 in town, okay? Didn't know them. They never talked
- 17 to me, but somebody had told me they are in town.
- 18 This is even before the office in Lexington I
- 19 believe; I don't know. But I didn't know about it.
- So I found out about the meeting. Well
- 21 then, of course, I am going to be involved. After
- 22 that meeting I was not happy with what I saw from
- 23 what I understand may have -- your recommendations
- 24 went to the board and I think they came back to you,

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- 1 **MR. BANGERT:** How close was, on this 2 project, the nearest turbine?
- 3 MR. JOLLY: On this project, just down the
- 4 road, I want to say they are within a mile, a little
- 5 over a half a mile. I am not sure.
- This project doesn't concern me as much as
- 7 the EDP because their 550-foot wingspan I'll call
- 8 it, there I have one 1644 feet behind my house.
- 9 That is why I am concerned. These need to be
- 10 stopped, period, subsidies and everything. If there
- 11 were no subsidies there would be no windmills. That
- 12 is where it stands.
- MR. BANGERT: So you farmed, and you farm
- 14 in and around this area?
- 15 MR. JOLLY: Yes.
- **MR. BANGERT:** Fairly close to where all
- 17 these are going to be going?
- **MR. JOLLY:** Yes, I do. I have two farms.
- 19 Where our home place is, we have 80 acres that we
- 20 purchased in 2004 with our home place to keep it in
- 21 the family. A mile over -- it would be a mile over
- 22 and a mile over is 160 acres that is in our family 23 that my grandfather went from that house, the
- 24 homestead, started 160 acres about 100 years ago,

- 1 and that mitigation agreement then ended up going to
- 2 5-foot grind on the concrete, which is what it
- 3 should be, and some other things that should have
- 4 been clarified.
- 5 So the other notifications that I've had
- 6 is just by small-town word of mouth. There is
- 7 nothing in -- you know, there ought to be some kind
- 8 of public notice in the town square people go to,
- 9 but no, no notice. I don't get the Pantograph. I
- 10 don't get the Leader. We get the Lexingtonian and
- 11 the Chenoa Town Crier.
- MR. BANGERT: Thanks. Facebook?
- MR. JOLLY: I don't get on Facebook. I
- 14 wouldn't be on there for nothing.
- 15 **MR. BANGERT:** Thank you.
- **16 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Any other questions
- 17 from the board?
- 18 Staff?
- **MR. DICK:** No thanks.
- 20 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** The applicant?
- MR. GRIFFIN: No thank you.

- 11 customers. Why they are not involved in this I have
- 12 no idea. Maybe they can answer. But right there,
- 13 now you've got those with Invenergy, and then this
- 14 last week now you are throwing EDP on top, and I
- 15 don't know how they intermingle or what. I haven't
- 16 seen enough maps to figure out how they work.
- **MS. WINTERLAND:** So I kind of have
- 18 questions about that. Can we ask you guys questions
- 19 about that, like how they intermingle and whether
- 20 they are talking to each other as far as noise
- 21 studies go?
- 22 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: We have no information
- 23 about it as a board.
- MS. WINTERLAND: Okay.

- 8 **MR. JOLLY:** If I may real quick? I am
- 9 sorry. That is not to do with you, Amy. Well,
- 10 maybe because you've seen them.
- In the area, I am a mail carrier. I have
- 12 seen six bald eagles, two golden eagles that I know
- 13 of. I am not an expert. They are huge. They are
- 14 beautiful, awesome birds. Never saw them before. I
- 15 know of a nest just north of Chenoa on the way to
- 16 Pontiac. I took my wife out there last week or so
- and we went out and checked it out and I got a
- 18 picture on my phone. Awesome, awesome sites. We
- 19 have deer and birds and everything running around as
- 20 they are now, too.
- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Any other questions?
- Thanks for coming. You did a good job.
- MR. JOLLY: Thank you.
- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** You don't have to be a

- 1 in birds, would mind coming up.
- 2 And you have been doing raptor studies I
- 3 believe systematically throughout the county, and if
- 4 you would come and give us a little bit of insight
- 5 on what you might have found should you have done
- 6 them through this area. I don't know.
- I am sorry to put you on the spot. I
- 8 haven't talked to you about this, other than I knew
- 9 you had done them historically, and I don't know if
- 10 you still do them on behalf of Audubon. And from
- 11 what I understand you do them systematically. And I
- 12 don't know. Okay.
 - DR. CAPPARELLA: Angelo Capparella,
- **14** A-n-g-e-l-o.

- **15 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** I think you need to be
- **16** sworn in.
- **DR. CAPPARELLA:** Oh, I'm sorry. I was
- 18 sworn in when I gave my testimony.
- 19 (DR. ANGELO CAPPARELLA PLACED UNDER OATH.)
- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** You're quite loud.
 - **DR. CAPPARELLA:** Oh, I'm sorry.
- 22 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: We can hear you quite
- 23 well. It's not a bad thing. I'm just saying, you
- 24 know, it's actually --

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- 1 **DR. CAPPARELLA:** I am sorry. I appreciate
- 2 it. No, I understand. It's my classroom lecturing
- 3 voice. Sorry about that. You tell me if I get too
- 4 voluminous.
- 5 All right. I am going to spell it.
- 6 A-n-g-e-l-o C-a-p-p-a-r-e-l-l-a, 907 South Fell
- 7 Avenue, Normal.
- Yes, I do raptor studies. They are a
- 9 project throughout the state, winter raptor surveys,
- 10 where one sets up 50-mile circuits that you do once
- 11 each month during the four months of what they
- 12 define as winter.
- I have one, and I myself monitor one in
- 14 McLean County and in Tazwell County, and a colleague
- 15 of mine does one in Woodford County, southeast of
- 16 Woodford County; I think it may straddle into McLean
- 17 a little, but I am not sure.
- However, my particular route does not go
- 19 through this part of the county where the footprint
- 20 of the proposed wind farm is, so I would not be able
- 21 to directly apply any data from that part of the
- 22 county. Ours basically goes from Morraine View to
- 23 Downs and then all the way south to near the DeWitt
- 24 County border and then back up through Funks Grove

- DR. CAPPARELLA: Yeah. In lieu of
- 2 credible evidence to the contrary, which I did not
- 3 see, if you compare the IDNR recommendation letter,
- 4 which is about 15 pages explaining why they made
- 5 these seven recommendations versus the
- 6 about-two-and-a-half-page response by Invenergy in
- 7 which they rejected outright five of them and the
- 8 other two only if you tell them to do it, which
- 9 basically was to me opinion versus evidence. I
- 10 would have like to have seen -- I would have
- 11 considered evidence against evidence to try to
- 12 evaluate that, but it sort of bothered me that
- 13 Invenergy just presented opinions without any
- 14 reasoned evidence or any evidence about that versus
- 15 DNR's rather extensive explanation of why they
- 16 thought all seven recommendations should be
- 17 followed.
- As a scientist, I am always open to
- 19 alternative perspectives. DNR isn't always right.
- 20 Nobody is always right. Scientific evidence
- 21 continues to grow. You always have to weigh and
- 22 balance these things. But as a scientist, I always
- 23 react negatively when somebody just says I am
- 24 throwing out your evidence just because I don't like

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- 1 and then Stanford, so I wouldn't be able to address
- 2 directly from any data that I have regarding
- 3 raptors.
- 4 MR. ZIMMERMAN: Do raptors range so that
- 5 any that you had seen in another part of the county
- 6 would be up there, or is that just irrelevant?
- **DR. CAPPARELLA:** Oh, yea. Oh, yeah.
- 8 Sure. I mean as people have noted, bald eagle
- 9 sightings are certainly -- we have certainly seen an
- 10 increase in bald eagle nests, and the result, young
- 11 and adult adults, they move wildly over the area,
- 12 particularly between feeding areas where the river
- 13 is open, where reservoirs are open and the like.
- 14 And we certainly have good -- I am sure the same
- 15 kinds of portions of raptors that we see in my route
- 16 kind of on the southern end of the county would be
- present in the northern end as well in terms of
- 18 raptors.
- Any other questions that I can try to
- 20 address them?
- MR. BANGERT: Going back to the DNR
- 22 recommendations, was it your position that they
- 23 should, every one of them should be followed or
- 24 certain ones?

- 1 it or think that, you know, you are wrong, but you
- 2 don't tell me why, you don't give me alternative
- 3 reasoning or anything like that; and I think that is
- 4 what -- I didn't see that happen in previous wind
- 5 farm applications. There was good evidence that was
- 6 presented to argue for or against adopting a
- 7 recommendation, and I don't see that here. And I
- 8 think that is what has troubled me the most from the
- 9 wildlife perspective.
- o So I guess, with a lack of compelling
- 11 contrary evidence, credible contrary evidence, I
- 12 would just say adopt all seven, but I didn't
- 13 actually say that in my recommendation testimony. I
- 14 said two of them for sure we need to adopt, and
- 15 others I think you can strongly argue for by what we
- 16 know about Heinlein Creek and what I am hearing 17 about Patton Creek.
- But should we, for example, really survey
- 19 for Franklin's ground squirrel? I could see a case
- 20 against doing that. But I didn't see that
- 21 presented.
- Should we be surveying for mud puppies,
- 23 which is one of the recommendations? I can see a
- 24 case you could make scientifically against doing

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- 1 that; but they didn't do it, and I don't know why.
- So, in lieu of that, I just say go with
- 3 the seven that the DNR said because at least they
- 4 made a case for it. Whether a counter-case could be
- 5 made or not, I think in a few cases that you could
- 6 make a counter-case, but I didn't see it made. So
- 7 you all will have to evaluate what you think about
- 8 mud puppies and setbacks and ground squirrels; and I
- 9 don't envy you being in that position.
- But if you do look at my own testimony,
- 11 the bat situation is really an important one to
- 12 consider and the adequate setbacks from INAI sites,
- 13 significant tributaries as well as the Mackinaw, I
- 14 think it is really important to maximize protection
- 15 of not only a system of nature reserves that is
- 16 currently operated for the public by Parkland's
- 17 Foundation but a lot of land that, to their credit,
- 18 landowners have kept in really good natural health,
- 19 and I believe very much in private landowners being
- 20 rewarded in a sense for doing that. Don't
- 21 compromise what they -- I hope that kind of gets
- 22 what you asked.
- MR. ZIMMERMAN: Thank you.
- 24 (BREAK TAKEN.)

1 whether it's \$5 or \$5 million or --

- **DR. CAPPARELLA:** I don't think these
- 3 studies done competently are that expensive just
- 4 because at least on some things, like I think I
- 5 mentioned through cross examination, mussel studies,
- 6 which I've done as a volunteer with DNR to help them
- 7 with their budgetary shortfalls, a lot of those kind
- 8 of basic survey studies, which is clearly what DNR
- 9 wants.
- I mean the one thing I've learned in
- 11 working with McLean County is, despite the initial
- 12 appearance of the average person coming in here that
- 13 there is no natural areas left at all and,
- 14 therefore, no wildlife or anything else to worry
- 15 about, I have been rather surprised at the number of
- 16 rediscoveries of organisms.
- The fact that I know our local birding
- 18 community often finds things that we didn't know
- 19 existed, still existed in the area. In a few rare
- 20 cases we actually discovered things that no
- 21 scientists knew were here before.
- So it behooves us to be careful not to say
- 23 something isn't here. It's very hard, obviously, to
- 24 prove an absence.

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- MR. ZIMMERMAN: What I am trying to get at
- 2 is are there -- is this an opportunity, were we to
- 3 vote for this wind farm, would there be an
- 4 opportunity to specify/stipulate that there would be
- 5 some studies done for, like, multiple years? And
- 6 would that, how much of that cost is what I am
- 7 trying to get at. I don't want to do something that8 is a huge burden financially or otherwise and that
- 9 would be worthless. And I would like to find out if
- 10 are there some studies that could be done, should
- 11 they be multiyear and could they be done cheaply?
- 12 Excuse me for being cheap.
- **DR. CAPPARELLA:** Oh, no. I work in a
- 14 public university, so I quite understand the need to
- 15 do that, and we do science there as well.
- I'm too close again?
- **MS. TURNER:** No, no, no. I am sorry. I
- 18 feel like that is a pretty detailed question that we
- 19 are asking for specific studies and specific prices,
- 20 which is great and I am, you know -- but should we
- 21 give him some time to prepare that and present that
- 22 if you are truly interested in that?
- MR. ZIMMERMAN: I am sort of interested.
- 24 I am just trying to see if there is a ballpark idea

- Many of the studies that Invenergy did do on certain target species I thought were very well
- 3 done; others that DNR is requesting is where they
- 4 saw deficiencies or at least DNR's opinion they saw
- 5 deficiencies on some things that used to be here or
- 6 may be here or are likely to be here based on
- 7 knowledge elsewhere, and they are asking Invenergy
- 8 to invest a little bit of money into doing that.
- 9 Again, I don't know the actual prices, but
- 10 typically those things are not that expensive in the
- 11 grand scheme of things and don't take that long to
- 12 do, such as mussel and fish surveys in perennial
- 13 streams. You know, that is my opinion based on some
- 14 personal experience where we just done it for free,
- 15 not that I am offering in this case.
- 16 MR. ZIMMERMAN: That's all.
- 17 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** I am going to let you
- 18 go. I appreciate you coming in.
- **DR. CAPPARELLA:** All right. Thank you.
- **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** We are at Number 5.
- 21 Rebuttal testimony from the applicant?
- MR. PARZYCK: Yes.
- 23 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: Remember, both of you
- 24 guys are under oath, but you got to state your name

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- 1 and address again.
- 2 (REBUTTAL FROM APPLICANT.)
- 3 MR. PARZYCK: You bet. It's Kevin, last
- 4 name Parzyck, P-a-r-z-y-c-k. I am at 1 South
- 5 Wacker, Suite 1800, Chicago, Illinois, 60606.
- Thank you. Just a short rebuttal here, if I may.
- 8 We have heard testimony from Misters
- 9 Thacker and Schertz who operate airstrips in and
- 10 around the project area. We would just like to sort
- 11 of respond to that.
- Since they both testified, we've been in
- 13 communication with both of them about the project
- 14 and their concerns with some turbine locations.
- 15 Concerning Mr. Thacker's airstrip, we've
- 16 agreed to eliminate Turbine Number 22 from the
- 17 project.
- In addition, we've agreed to shift Turbine
- 19 Number 23 to a distance which would be 2700 feet
- 20 east of the Thacker runway, which would be in
- 21 accordance with the request that Mr. Thacker had
- 22 regarding a half mile clear on both sides of the
- 23 runway. And as I said, we had been in discussions
- 24 with Mr. Thacker regarding that matter.

- 1 have spoken with Mr. Schertz on this matter. We've
 - 2 agreed to shift Turbine Number 78 to the northwest
 - 3 approximately 1100 feet.
 - 4 In addition, we've agreed to shift Turbine
 - 5 Number 74 west 300 feet.
 - 6 And because we had mentioned we were using
 - 7 two different types of turbines, the turbine with
 - 8 the 116-meter rotor is shorter, the tip height is
 - 9 shorter, so what we are proposing is to use the
 - shorter GE 2.3 116 model turbine at that location.
 - 11 So it would be lower and it's moved west.
 - As I said, we have been in discussion with
 - 13 Mr. Schertz regarding this matter. And we
 - 14 appreciate our communications with both Mr. Thacker
 - 15 and Schertz and are pleased that we were able to
 - 16 reach an understanding regarding these turbines.
 - MR. DICK: Mr. Parzyck, which way did you
 - 18 say Number 78 is to be moved 1100 feet?

MR. PARZYCK: Turbine 78 is to be moved

- 20 northwest, so approximately 1100 feet.
- MR. DICK: Thank you.
 - MR. GRIFFIN: And, Mr. Parzyck, has
- 23 Invenergy also agreed to withdraw and withdraw from
- 24 its application Turbine Number 80?

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- 1 MR. GRIFFIN: Jim Griffin, Schain Banks.
- 2 And we have a couple pieces of
- 3 correspondence we want to make sure are entered into
- 4 the record. I believe the next exhibit is 17; is
- 5 that correct, Phil, for the applicant?
- 6 **MR. DICK:** The next one is 17.
- 7 MR. GRIFFIN: So the Applicant's Exhibit
- 8 Number 17 is a letter dated January 17, 2018, from
- 9 Mr. Thacker to Gordon Gray of Invenergy. And
- 10 Number 18 that I'll pass out in a moment is a letter
- 11 from the AOPA. I'll say what that stands for. What
- 12 does than stand for? It's their airline or airport
- 13 organization, and it's dated January 18, 2018. And
- 14 that will be applicant's Number 18.
- **MS. WALLEY:** Mr. Griffin, did you move to admit your exhibits?
- MR. GRIFFIN: I would like to do so, yes.
- 18 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** So moved.
- MS. WALLEY: Is that the end of your
- 20 rebuttal testimony?
- 21 MR. PARZYCK: No. I am sorry.
- MS. WALLEY: It's okay.
- MR. PARZYCK: And then, second to that,
- 24 concerning Mr. Schertz's airstrip, we've agreed we

- MR. PARZYCK: That is correct. We would
- 2 also like to remove Turbine Number 80 from our
- 3 application, and that is consistent with the half
- 4 mile setback from the Mackinaw River main channel.
- 5 That's all I have.
- 6 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Any staff want to
- 7 question?
- 8 Did you say you have an agreement with
- **9** Mr. Schertz, or you are working on one?
- .0 **MR. PARZYCK:** We spoke with him. We
- 11 discussed it on the phone. We discussed those
- 12 locations. I would say that Mr. Schertz is saying,
- 13 you know, there is going to be turbines in the area
- 14 but it reduces the risk that he had expressed in his
- 15 testimony.
- **MS. WALLEY:** Are you for cross
- 17 examination?
- 18 MR. PARZYCK: I am.
- MS. WALLEY: The Chairman asked me to
- 20 remind everyone, since Mr. Parzyck is up here to
- 21 testify, anyone can come up and cross examination
- 22 him but your examination is limited to only what he
- 23 just testified to, so that would be Turbines 22, 23,
- 24 78, 74, and 80 and their removal, their shifting,

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- 1 their withdrawal. So if you would like to cross
- 2 examine him about those things only, please come up.
- 3 (CROSS EXAMINATION BY MR. LUETKEHANS.)
- 4 MR. LUETKEHANS: Phil Luetkehans, 105 East
- 5 Irving Park Road.
- Mr. Parzyck, what I don't see is a
- 7 requisite as a noise study with the effect of these
- 8 moving turbines. Has that been done?
- 9 MR. PARZYCK: Well, consistent with the
- 10 recommendations that were presented at the beginning
- 11 of the application, the comment is that, if the
- 12 applicant changes the project layout or turbine
- 13 types, choose alternative turbine types and/or
- 14 employs different blades that the different -- that
- 15 the noise analysis should be upgraded accordingly,
- 16 complianced and demonstrated. We have run those
- 17 analyses at this point. We have not submitted them,
- 18 but at this point we have done calculations
- 19 regarding compliance.
- MR. LUETKEHANS: But those have not been
- 21 submitted for any of us to cross examine on or
- 22 review, correct?
- MR. PARZYCK: They have not been
- 24 submitted.

- 1 think that is what you want to do.
- 2 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: I am going to let my
- I don't know what we can do to appease this.
- You know, you are willing to bring it this
- 7 next week. That is all we can do at this point, and
- 8 that's, to my point, is all we can do.
- 9 MR. LUETKEHANS: Well, I understand that,
- .o and I guess I wanted to just make the point and take
- 11 the position for the record that the inability to
- 12 cross examine on that with any fair ability
- 13 violates, in our opinion, the Klaeren Rules and
- 14 makes it really impossible for effective cross
- 15 examination.
- MR. GRIFFIN: I'll just note, I have cross
- 17 examined all those opposition witnesses that I've
- 18 chosen to without any prior knowledge of their
- 19 testimony or their reports.
- MR. LUETKEHANS: Just because Mr. Griffin
- 21 has cross examined one expert who he knew was coming
- 22 ahead of time, knew what he was going to testify to,
- 23 and was very familiar with on a situation where we
- 24 do not have technical reports like this --

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- MR. LUETKEHANS: So there is no way for
- 2 us, as we sit here, to know whether/how that changes
- 3 any of the noise levels of any of the receptors,
- 4 correct?
- 5 **MR. PARZYCK:** They have not been
- 6 submitted.
- 7 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** We are not going to
- 8 get finished tonight, of course. Would it be
- 9 something you could furnish to us next week, on
- 10 Monday?
- 11 MR. PARZYCK: Yes.
- **12 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Okay. Would that be
- 13 agreeable?
- MR. LUETKEHANS: It's agreeable for the
- 15 submission, but it doesn't give us any opportunity
- 16 to cross examine or to have someone review them. It
- 17 really puts everybody in this -- I mean I know you
- 18 are trying to get this done. We are trying to get
- 19 it done as well. But you've put us in a position
- 20 where they are moving three or four turbines -- I
- 21 can't count -- sorry -- and us not having any idea
- 22 what that does or being able to examine what that
- 23 does. It's an impossible situation unless you want
- 24 to continue this hearing for weeks, and I don't

- 1 CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN: We are going to tell
- 2 you is your objection is noted, and we'll take it
- 3 under advisement.
- 4 MR. LUETKEHANS: Thank you.
- 5 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** Thank you.
- 6 Is there anything else you wanted to
- 7 present in rebuttal?
- **MR. GRIFFIN:** No. We are finished.
- 9 **CHAIRMAN FINNIGAN:** I guess did the board
- 10 have any questions about any of this? It would be
- 11 just on what they testified to.
- (QUESTIONS BY THE BOARD:)
- MR. BANGERT: This data that was just
- 14 requested, how quickly will you have it available?
- MR. PARZYCK: It depends on the -- I mean

- 3 what -- counsel is checking with our consultant
- 4 here, so let me just check with him.
- **MS. TURNER:** In the meantime, can I ask another question? 6
- **MR. PARZYCK:** Oh, sure. I am sorry. 7
- MS. TURNER: Which of those movements will
- cause any of these to be closer to a house, closer
- to a resident, a nonparticipating resident?
- 11 MR. PARZYCK: One moment.
- MS. TURNER: That is really the heart of 12
- 13 all of this.
- 14 **MR. GRIFFIN:** If I can jump in, the staff
- proposed stipulations, which is what Mr. Parzyck
- 16 read, do permit the turbine locations to be moved so
- long as compliance is demonstrated, and that is a
- building permit requirement. So there is some
- flexibility, which I think is a good idea, in order
- for turbines to be relocated, locations changed so
- 21 long as it's demonstrated to be in compliance.
- So I certainly don't want to be penalized 22
- 23 for trying to move turbines to accommodate concerns
- 24 that people have and that we are responding to.

- 1 enact as stipulations that we undertake these
- movements and we'll leave the application as is.
- **MR. LUETKEHANS:** That is -- so, well then,
- I guess I would argue against any stipulation that
- allows them to move turbines 1100 feet.
- **MS. WALLEY:** I don't think we are to the 6 argument point.
- MR. LUETKEHANS: I guess that is what he's
- talking about doing, and I think it's important for
- the board to understand that 1100 feet is a lot of 11 feet.
- MS. WALLEY: I understand that. 12
- MR. LUETKEHANS: Without us having the 13
- 14 right to cross examine, you pretty much said he can
- 15 move whatever he wants later and tell you or tell
- everybody that it's moved.
- 17 MS. WALLEY: If you could, save it for
- 18 argument. I know the board wants to hear what you
- 19 have to say.
- 20 Am I correct in understanding that you are
- 21 now -- that your testimony or your rebuttal is
- 22 different now than it was a minute ago or is
- 23 revised?
- 24 **MR. GRIFFIN:** Well, what is going to be

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- Otherwise, I suppose we would have been
- 2 better off just saying we are not going to respond 3 to those complaints because we don't want to have
- 4 this continued on for a lengthy period of time.
- 5 That's just a statement. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
- MS. WALLEY: Mr. Griffin, were you able to
- 7 find out anything about the noise revised or
- reviewed noise study?
- MR. GRIFFIN: I don't know that we could
- 10 have a complete noise study by Monday. Mr. Hankard
- 11 would be able to testify that according to the model
- that he has reviewed it and he's confirmed that. He
- can give his testimony, though, but we wouldn't have

- **MR. LUETKEHANS:** So we were being put in 15
- 16 an untenable situation of having nothing ahead of

- and we have the right to cross examine especially
- 21 expert testimony, which is really what we are
- 22 talking about here, and effectively cross examine.
